Pension application of William Parker R7950 Mary f26VA Transcribed by Will Graves 9/1/12

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

Rutherford County State of North Carolina

On this 15th day of June 1859, personally appeared before [indecipherable word] T. G. Hawkins JP one of the acting Justices of the peace within and for the County and State aforesaid, Mary Parker aged eighty-one years and a resident of said County, who after being duly sworn according to law, maketh oath and declares, That she is the widow of William Parker deceased, who, was as he always told her, That he served as a private in the revolutionary war in the Regiment commanded by Colonel George Mathews of the State of Virginia, She does not recollect the name of the Captain in whose Company he belonged, nor whether he said he was drafted or volunteered; but recollects that he told her he was in service some five years and six months, neither can she remember the year that he went into service, but thinks That he told her, That he came out of Service at the end of the war.

That she distinctly remembers, That he had a discharge, but some time after their marriage, it was burnt up in his shop, That he (Parker) was a boot and shoe maker, at that time of his life, and quite careless and much addicted to dissipation, was the way that his papers came to be burned.

That she married said Parker to the best of her recollection about fifty years ago, having no written record of their marriage – That they were married in Campbell County Virginia by a Methodist preacher by the name of Heath, and from her marriage, she had but one child by said Parker, her husband – that some fifteen or twenty years since, her husband died in the aforesaid County, Virginia, and after his death she removed to Rutherford County North Carolina, where she still lives.

She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June three or four years ago, for the benefit of those widows, who married their husbands since the year 1800: – the date of the month and year when Congress passed said act she is not in possession of.

Sworn to and subscribed before me the day and year above mentioned. And I certify I have no interest in the result of the case and am not concerned in its prosecution.

State of North Carolina County of Rutherford

On this 24th day of October 1859 personally appeared before me T. G. Hawkins, one of the Acting Justices of the County, Mary Parker a resident of said County, aged eighty-one years, who after being duly sworn according to law, doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefits of the provision made by the Act of Congress passed on the 3rd of

February 1853, granting pensions to widows of persons who served during the Revolutionary war; that she is the widow of William Parker, who was a private in Colonel Mathews' Regiment, and was in service five years and six months – and entered the service somewhere near Richmond Virginia and that her marriage to him was in Campbell County Virginia and that he died in said County, about 15 or 16 years ago – She further declares that she was married to him sometime in May 1809; that her said husband died as near as she recollects about 15 or 16 years ago; That she was not married to him prior to the 2nd January 1800, but at the time above stated – She further declares that she is still a widow.

This is to certify that it appears from a list in this department of such officers & soldiers of the Virginia Continental line, during the Revolutionary War as settled their accounts, and received certificates for the balance of their full pay, according to an act of Assembly, passed the November Session 1781, that a certificate issued on the 20th day of November 1783 in the name of William Parker as a private of Infantry for £34; which certificate appears to have been delivered to Colonel George Mathews, and was given for services prior to the 1st of January 1782. This is to certify, that it appears from a list in this office of such Officers and Soldiers of the Virginia Continental Line as settled their accounts and received certificates for the balance of their full pay, according to an act of assembly, passed the November session 1781, directing the Auditors of Public Accounts to settle and adjust the pay and accounts of said Officers and Soldiers from the first January 1777 to 31st December 1781, (see Hening's Statutes at Large, vol. 10, p. 462,) that a settlement was made on the 20th day of November 1783 in the name of William Parker as Sol. Infy. And evidence of the indebtedness of the State to him was £34.0.0,delivered to Col. Geo. Mathews but as the original settlements or copies thereof or not to be found in this office, the term of service embraced therein cannot be stated.
