Pension Application of William Bennett R8

VA Sea Service

The only document in the jacket for the federal application relating to military service is the following letter:1

Pension Office/ January 13, 1846

I certify that I have examined the case of of William Bennett, deceased, who was a Sailing Master in the Virginia State Navy during the revolutionary war; and I find that under the act of the 5 July 1832 half-pay was allowed from the 22^d of April 1783. Half-pay is now claimed from the 19th of May 1781, and it is my opinion that the claim should be allowed. I therefore certify that there is due to the administrator of said Bennett half-pay for service as a Sailing Master at the rate of one hundred and fifty-two dollars and eight cents per annum from the 19 May 1781, when he left the service, until the 22^d April 1783, and that the amount is payable to Covington Bennett, administrator of William Bennett. The amount to be sent in a draft to the administrator at Pungoteague, Virginia.

I hereby certify that I was well acquainted with William Bennet who served with me in the State Navy during the Revolutionary war under the Command of Comodore James Barron [Commodore James Barron [VAS1949], that he was occasionally changed from the Boat Liberty to the Boat Patriot as the James Buth whole crew were. The deposition of Scarborough Bloxom [Scearborough Bloxom W5842] aged about Seventy Seven years who deposeth and Saith that he enlisted on Board the galley Accomack as a Midshipman before the Gally was launched and continued in that capacity untill orders were received to dismantle and lay the Gally up that he was well acquainted with William Bennett Master of the Gally Diligence that he enlisted in that capacity when the Diligence first went into service and continued in her untill She was ordered to be laid up and dismantled that the said William Bennet as well as this deponent recollects was of the County of Accomack – that he knew [undeciphered] well after the war untill his death – further this deponent saith

I certify it appears from a list of such of the names of the Seamen of the Virginia State Navy as received Certificates for the balance of their full pay, agreeably to the Act of assembly passed the November Session 1781 that a certificate issued on the 28^{th} day of April 1785 in the name of William Bennett Master for £187.11.— which certificate was delivered to Col. John Cropper [W3781]. Given under my hand in the Auditors Office this 8^{th} day of March 1831
