## Pension application of Henry Hatcher S13326 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Kentucky Green County Sct.

On this 30<sup>th</sup> day of August 1832 personally appeared before the Green Circuit Court holden for Green County State aforesaid Henry Hatcher a resident of said County and state aforesaid aged 76 years, in May last past, who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress of the 7<sup>th</sup> day of June 1832.

That he enlisted as a regular Soldier in the United States Army in the war of the American Revolution in the County of Chesterfield State of Virginia in the year 1775 for two years in what was called the seventh Virginia Regiment, commanded by Colonel Innis<sup>1</sup> as he thinks of this he is not confident, he served in the company commanded by Charles Fleming, William Mosley Lieutenant, General Woodford [William Woodford] commanded the Brigade while I was at the North. The Captain of my company was afterwards promoted to the command of a Regiment – he served out the two years the time of his enlistment and was discharged in Pennsylvania at Middlebrook [sic, Middlebrook is in New Jersey not Pennsylvania] – his discharge he has lost or destroyed. He marched from Virginia where he enlisted to Gwins Island [Gwynn Island], from thence to Little York, & from thence marched to Williamsburg, & spent the winter – & while in winter quarters, the troops there were sent for & ordered to the North to aid General Washington who was retreating in the Jerseys a short time before he took the Hessians prisoners [Battle of Trenton, December 26, 1776] – He was at the battle of Brandywine [September 11, 1777] but not engaged, but was engaged in the battle of Germantown [October 4, 1777], & afterwards, he was in Gates defeat [Battle of Camden, August 15-16, 1780], serving as a militia man and was at the Surrender of Cornwallis at Little York [October 19, 1781]. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or an annuity except the present, and he declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency in any State.

On this 30<sup>th</sup> day of August 1832 Edward Haskins personally appeared before the Judge of the Green Circuit Court holden for Green County & State of Kentucky who being first duly

sworn according to law on his oath makes the following statement in relation to the services performed by the Applicant Henry Hatcher, to wit: That about the year 1775 he recollects that said Henry Hatcher left home and remained absent for about two years and it was understood in said Hatcher's neighborhood that he was in the service of his country as a soldier of the revolution from his knowledge of the absence of said Hatcher and the general report in the neighborhood in which said Hatcher resided said Haskins states that he believes he served as stated by said Hatcher in his declaration.
