Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." State of Alabama Fayette County: Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

On this 3rd day of September 1832 personally appeared before the Honorable Walter Harkins Judge of the County Court of Fayette County now sitting Samuel Morrow a resident of said State and County aged about eighty-six years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832, That he enlisted in the Army of the United States sometime in February 1776 with Captain Brown [William Brown] in Chester district South Carolina and served with him until he was promoted to the rank of Major and the remainder of his time under Captain McClintock [William McClintock] which terminated about 1777 as well as recollected, He served under General Sumter [Thomas Sumter] and Colonel Henderson [William Henderson] one tour of enlistment. He fought in growth the Cherokee Indians and was also at the Battle of the Black Stocks [sic, Blackstocks, November 20, 1780] where General Sumter was wounded and was in a great many small contest against the English and Tories and then given those are marched to Charleston South Carolina and from thence to Savannah Georgia, and Sunbury and from thence to the Altamaha River against the Creek Indians and was engaged in several small battles against the Creek Indians and then marched to the Tuckaw [Tuckahoe ?] Swamp in South Carolina and there received a discharge from General Sumter which discharge is lost or mislaid so that it cannot be found; He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency in any State.

Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid S/ Walter Harkins, Judge of the County Court.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$45.77 per annum commencing March 4, 1831, for service as a private for 13 months in 22 days in the South Carolina Continental line and militia.]
