## Pension application of Ezekiel Jenkins S16163 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Indiana Clark County: SS

On this 27<sup>th</sup> day of October 1832 personally appeared before the Honorable John F Ross President & John Carr & Samuel Prather Associate Judges of the Circuit Court of Clark County. Ezekiel Jenkins, a resident of said County & state aged sixty-nine years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed June 7, 1832. That he enlisted in the Army of the United States in the month of April in the year 1779 with Captain Calames [probably Marquis Calmes] as a soldier for the term of three years – and served in the 4<sup>th</sup> Regiment of the Virginia troops under the following named officers, General Morgan [Daniel Morgan], Colonel Stanhope, <sup>2</sup> Captain Marcus Calames [sic] & Lieutenant George Jump (does not recollect the name of the Major of the Regiment) – that he continued in the service for the term of three years & was discharged at the expiration of the term on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of April 1782. - That he resided in the County of Louden [Loudoun] in the State of Virginia when he entered the service. That during his term of service – he marched through the states of North Carolina & South Carolina & into the State of [word written through and illegible but presumably was intended to refer to "Georgia"], he was in several skirmishes with the British and Tories in that section of the Country and was in the battle of the Cowpens [January 17, 1781] – & was at the siege of Yorktown in 1781 and the surrender of the British forces at that place under Cornwallis [October 19, 1781] – from York he was marched to Albemarle Barracks, where he was stationed guarding British prisoners until the expiration of the time of his enlistment, on the 15 April 1782, when he was discharged. – The written evidence of which he lost many years since.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and he declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency of any state.
