State of Tennessee } This 30th day of August 1832 personally appeared in open Court before the worshipful justices of the court of pleas and quarter sessions now sitting John Franklin County } Furgeson aged 74 years who after being duly sworn doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of congress passed June the 7th 1832 I was born in the year 1758 in the state of virginia & County of Hanover while I was a child my father mooved to Henrico county in the same state I entered the serverce at about 18 or 19 years of age & as a Militiaman under Captain Brooks this applican does not recollect the given name of said Brooks but believes it was John nor does he recollect the number of or name of the regiment more than that Col Josiah Nichols & Maj Richard Stublifield [sic: Richard Stubblefield] & his Capt was all in the regiment & that general Henry Lawson [sic: Robert Lawson] was the General we marched first from the neghbourhood of Richmond to Williamsburg we marched from there to Sandy point where we remained untill our three months was out where I got my discharge from Capt Brooks I then returned home to Henrico County I remainded at home a few weeks & was called out again under Capt Thomas Richardson who was of the same Regiment of Capt Brooks I was marched from home to Williams Burg we stayed there a few days & marched back to Richmond & remained there days & marched back to Richmond & remained there until my second three months was out where I received another discharge which was given by Capt Richardson I was not immediately present at the receiving discharges & Lieutenant Benjamin Good received it for me, who afterwards gave it to me I then returned home which was about the last of April the year this applicant does not recollect I remained at home probably one month Serjant Carter who was under the command of Colonel John Pleasants was ordered out with 8 men among whom I was one to collect cattle & carry to little york the Cattle was in pastures this side of Williamsburg from where we took them to little york I was continued there until I got my discharge which was given me in Williamsburg on the twenty fifth day of oct after the capture of Lord Cornwallis [19 Oct 1781] from there I returned home to Henrico County this was the last time I was in the service I remained in Henrico County 3 or 4 months after I returned home & then mooved mooved into Buckingham a distance of about seventy miles where I lived about three years & then mooved to prince Edward County where I also lived about three years when I mooved to Cumberland County where lived about 8 years when I mooved back into Buckingham County & lived there about six years from there I mooved to the state of Tennessee Anderson County where I lived about 15 years about [illegible number] years after which my house was burned & my discharges consumed in it I mooved from there to Franklin County Tennessee where I have lived ever since which has been fifteen or sixteen years & still expect to live I have no record of my age but from the accounts I received from my father & mother I am in about 74 years of age I was known to most of the officers whom I have mentioned in this my declaration & many other officers & soldiers I hereby relinquish every claim whatsoever to a pension or annuity except the present & declare that my name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state in the united states sworn & subscribed the day & year aforesaid John hisXmark Ferguson

By Capt Richardson. I was not immediately present at the receiving discharges & Lieutenant Benjamin Good received it for me who afterwards gave it to me. Then returned home which was about the last of April the year this applicant does not recollect. I remained at home probably one month. Sergeant Carter who was under the command of Colonel John Pleasant was ordered out with 8 men among whom I one to collect cattle & carry to Little York. Brief of case

[Ed. Note: the DC clerk, Chas L Jones, marked that the length of the third term was not stated and ignored the May to October term stated. That cost the old soldier a few shillings, about 5/6 of \$20/annum. I suggest that the Ferguson heirs sue the Jones heir personally for recovery of damages since the treasury already owes about \$17T. Jones also noted the lack of clerk's seal on the documents which might explain the delay from August to March and the later note that Franklin County had no embossing device. No damages were incurred from that delay, as the certificate show arrearages paid.]

[p15] At the end of the John Ferguson folder is bounty land warrant 13074 of Joseph Ferguson, private in Hagen's regiment issued 10Jul1789 to Ann O'Brian (late Ann Ferguson) the widow and legal representative.
