Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." The State of South Carolina Anderson District

On this 4th day of March 1833 personally appeared in Open Court before the Judge of the Court of Sessions & common pleas of said State aforesaid District now in Session William Hubbard Senior of the State & District aforesaid who being duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7-1832

This Deponent was born in Halifax County Virginia and removed to Guilford County North Carolina when very young not recollecting the time – and moved to Anderson District South Carolina in 1792 or thereabouts – he was drafted in his 16th year while in Guilford County North Carolina Captain Campbell's Company – Colonel Martin – General Lincoln – marched in an expedition through South Carolina to Charleston. In service in that expedition 4 months – he afterwards attached himself to Captain Oldham's ¹ Company – Colonel Moore [William Moore] General Butler [John Butler] – forty days service – he again attached himself to Captain McDow in a scouting party – served three months – he again attached himself to Captain Peter O'Nealle [Peter O'Neal?] Colonel William O'Nealle [William O'Neal?] – three months service – he had, but has lost, his discharge – nor has he received any compensation – he knows of no other Testimony of his service but what is furnished with this document.

In Open Court 4th day of March 1833

He substituted himself instead of Dewitt Rodgers and served the balance of his time – 6 weeks – The deponent believes that he served 12 months – Sworn to & subscribed this 4th day of March 1833 – He relinquishes every claim whatever to a Pension except the present and declares his name is not on the pension roll of the Agency of any State.

I certify that I have known William Hubbard ever since he was a boy. He served one tour of duty during the war of the Revolution in my company. He was during that struggle a good Whig & has sustained a good character sense – sworn to in open Court the day and year aforesaid. S/ Van A. Lawhon, CC

[fn p. 8: On November 23, 1855 in Anderson District South Carolina, William Hubbard, aged in his 94th year, filed for his bounty land entitlement as a soldier of the revolution and currently a pensioner under a certificate numbered 3425. He signed this application with his mark.]

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$41.55 per annum commencing March 4th, 1831, for 12 months & 14 days service as a private in the North Carolina militia.]
