State of Virginia

County of Fairfax to wit

On this 15<sup>th</sup> day of February 1821 before me the subscriber, a Justice of the peace for the said County of Fairfax, personally appeared John Powell who on his oath declares that he is the same person who formerly belonged to the Company Commanded by Captain Howard [sic: Thomas Hord] in the regiment commanded by Col. Beaufort [sic: Abraham Buford] in the Service of the United States, that he was in Beauforts defeat [Battle of Waxhaws SC, 29 May 1780] when & where he received sundry wounds, on account of which he was placed on the pension roll of the State of Virginia, that he has never received a certificate of that fact under the signature & seal of the Secretary of War, but that he has regularly received his pension up to the 4<sup>th</sup> day of September 1818, & that he at present receives five Dollars thirty three & one third cents p month [signed] John Powell

[The following are in the <u>bounty-warrant papers in the Library of Virginia</u>:]

I Do Certify that Serg't John Powell did Enlist in the Continental Service, with Capt. Thomas West of  $10^{th}$  V. Reg't. in January 1777 for 3 years and after the Expiration of which time he reenlisted for the War in the  $6^{th}$  and always conducted him Self as a Brave and faithfull Soldier As Witness my hand this  $10^{th}$  of May 1784-I do also believe he has receiv'd no wages since Aug't. 1779

Thos. Pearson Lt [Thomas Pearson]/6<sup>th</sup> VR

The above Serg't. Powell was wounded in col'l. Bufords defeat at the Waxsaws & was taken prisoner in May 1780 since which time he [ha]s not been in service. Samuel Hawes Lt. Colo.

## NOTES:

In a deposition in support of an application for bounty land by heirs of Rhodam Moxley (BLWt597-200), Powell deposed that he was "badly wounded" at the Battle of Waxhaws. Powell's pension certificate and other documents show that he was a Sergeant.

Also in the file is a letter written and signed by John Powell from Centreville in Fairfax County.
