## Pension application of James Kitchen S31192 Transcribed by Will Graves

Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

## State of Indiana County of Warren: SS

On this 6<sup>th</sup> day of October 1832 personally appeared in open Court the said Court being a Circuit Court for the County and State aforesaid, James kitchen resident in said County aged sixty-seven years on the 25<sup>th</sup> day of October 1832, who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed June 6<sup>th</sup>, 1832 [June 7, 1832], that he enlisted in the Army of the United States in the year seventy-nine or eighty as he verily believes with Captain John Mountjoy of the State Troops of the State of Virginia. Served under Colonel Miner [Minor?]. The number of the Regiment he served and not recollected but he served under the following named officers.

General Weeden [George Weedon] commanded the brigade or division that he belonged to Colonel Minor the Regiment Captain John Mountjoy commanded the Company that he served in Edmund Mountjoy was the Lieutenant and the orderly Sergeant Charles Henson of said Company =

Did not serve all the term that he enlisted for to serve he thinks that he served a few months more than two years in all, was enlisted for three years he left the service sometime in the month of October or November 1782 – He resided in the County of Stafford and State of Virginia when he entered the service. From whence he was marched immediately after being enlisted to James Hunter's ferry on the Rappahannock River, where he crossed said River thence through Fredericksburg in Spotsylvania County in Virginia, Thence through a part of the County of Caroline County Virginia to Bowlingreen [Bowling Green], thence was marched back again to the County of Stafford aforesaid there to be ready when called into Service remained in said County of Stafford several months without being called he was called to go against Cornwallis, Marched to Williamsburg, thence to Springfield near York River, stationed until Cornwallis was taken [October 19, 1781], then marched as a guard to take Cornwallis's troops that were prisoners to Winchester Barracks in Virginia where he was finally discharged in the month of October or November 1782.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and he declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid

his pension benefits to the Illinois agency describing himself as the same man who served under Captain John Mountjoy in the Regiment commanded by Colonel John Miner and giving as his reason for moving to Illinois to live with his daughter the wife of William Hall.]

[p 11: On September 7, 1842 in Fulton County Illinois, the veteran applied for the transfer of his pension benefits to the Illinois agency describing himself as the same man who served under Captain John Mountjoy in the Regiment commanded by Colonel John Miner and giving as his reason for moving to Illinois to live with his daughter the wife of William Hall.]

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$80 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831, for service as a private for 2 years in the Virginia service.]
