Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Kentucky Henry County Sct.

On this 13<sup>th</sup> day of August 1832 personally appeared in open Court before Samuel Todd, Judge of the Circuit Court for the County aforesaid, Lewis Neale [sic] a resident of said County of Henry and State aforesaid aged 72 years the 4<sup>th</sup> day of July 1832, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named Officers and served as herein stated. Viz. Under Captain John Rice as a Volunteer in the Virginia militia in the month of April 1781 joined the Army at Shocks Hill in the County of Frederick State of Virginia, the Regiment was commanded by Colonel Elias Edmonds, and General Lafayette commander in chief of the Troops at that place: He resided in the County of Frederick State of Virginia = from Shocks Hill the Army advanced about 12 miles to Soure Springs on James River below Richmond, the Army encamped there about twelve days and then retreated to Richmond and that night an attack was made on Manchester and the Americans were routed – from Richmond the Army retreated to Hanover Court House & from thence to Raccoon Ford where General Wayne [Anthony Wayne] joined the Army at Brock's bridge the said Neale declares as aforesaid that he was a forage master under a Major's pay – from Brock's bridge the Army Grand moved on down the River by land to York or near their and was there discharged after three months service and came Home = He afterwards entered the service for three months as a substitute for his Brother William Neale who was drafted this act he did Voluntarily; having left home he joined the Company at Winchester, the Captain lived on the South Branch of Potomac he believes and he was stationed at Parishes Hill under Colonel Holmes at this time – & having served three months he was discharged at or near Winchester: He can prove the first Tour (in part by John Blackmore [sic] and that he knows of know [no] person, whose testimony he can procure who can testify to the remainder of his services.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State = that he has lost his discharges & his commission & has no documentary evidence of his said service. Sworn to and subscribed the day & year aforesaid.

[John Jones, a clergyman, and John Blakemore gave the standard supporting affidavit – he also added that they knew the veteran in Frederick County Virginia and that he was generally reputed

to have been a soldier.]

Henry County State of Kentucky

On this 13 day of August 1832 personally appeared in open Court (being a Circuit Court for the County aforesaid and a Court of Record) John Blakemore <sup>1</sup> and made oath according to law, that Lewis Neale who has filed his declaration for a Pension in said Court on the day of the date hereof, did entered the Service with him at the same time under Captain John Rice as a Bound here in the Virginia Militia under the several other officers as in said declaration mentioned, and was with him continually until they were separated at Brocks Bridge in Amelia County. That the said Blakemore was with him the said Neale at the place (as stated by him in his said declaration) called the Magazine or Bull pen as a nick=name that said Neale was seen by him after they returned home = and he the said Blakemore verily believes that he the said Neale did serve as he states in his declaration & that it is so generally believed.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$20 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831, for service as a private for 6 months in the Virginia militia.]
