[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later intereenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

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United States of America Territory of Arkansas County of Washington

On this 12th day of December A.D. 1833 personally appeared in open Court before the Judge of the Washington Circuit Court now sitting, Warren Phillpot [sic], a resident of the County and Territory aforesaid, aged Seventy Seven years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June the 7th in the year of our Lord 1832.

He entered the service of the United States under the following named officers, and served as herein stated. Volunteered in the latter part of June or the 1st of July in the year A.D. 1776 under Captain Phillip Mironas [?]¹ of the Cavalry of the United States [indecipherable word or words] Lieutenant Colonel Griffin Colonel Commandant, was at the battle of the White Plains in the fall of 1776, was discharged from the service the first of December 1776. Volunteered again on the 12th or 15th of October in the year 1777 belonged to Captain John Jacob Sly's Company in the Regiment commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Shriork [?] and William Betty or Bettin² Colonel Commandant, discharged the 12th or 15th of December 1777 making a tour of two months. Volunteered again on the 12th of February in the year 1781 under Captain Nevill³ Colonel Preston⁴ Commandant was at the battle of Whiterzls Mills [sic, Weitzel's Mills]⁵ Guilford County North Carolina discharged about the 15th of March 1781 lived then in the State of Virginia Montgomery County that he has no documentary evidence of the facts as herein set forth, that there is no person living whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his Services.

I hereby relinquish every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and I declare that my name is not on the pension roll of any Agency of any State whatever. Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid



Interrogatories by the Court

Quest. 1st Where and in what year were you born?

Ansr 1. I was born in the County of Charles State of Maryland the 28th day of August in the year of Christ 1756

Quest. 2nd Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?

Ansr 2.: there is no record of my age that I know of

Quest. 3rd Where were you living when called into service: where have you lived since the Revolutionary War and where do you now live?

Ansr 3: I was living in the County of Frederick State of Maryland left that County and State in the year 1778 moved to the County of Bedford State of Virginia, left that County in State in the year 1779, moved to the County of Guilford North Carolina moved back to the County and State aforesaid in the year 1780, moved in the year 1784 to the County of Franklin State of Georgia, moved to the County of Pendleton in the State of South Carolina in the year 1801, moved to the County of Warren State of Tennessee in the year 1807, then moved to the County of Washington Territory of Arkansas in the year 1830 where I now live.

Quest. 4th How were you called into service; were you drafted; did you volunteer or were you a substitute, and if in substitute, for whom?

Ansr: 4th: I volunteered in every instance and never was a Substitute.

Quest. 5th State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops when you served, such Continental and militia regiments as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service.

Ansr 5th: Col. Shironk [?] and Col. Griffin are the principal officers that I now recollect, that commanded at the battle of White Plains and Colonel Preston the principal officer that commanded at Weitzel's Mills. We had one officer by the name of Bell the aforesaid officers are the principal ones now recollected by me. We labored under divers disadvantages and as to the general Circumstances of my Campaigns I will refer you to the history of our Country in the years I served as they have principally escaped my memory.

Quest. 6th Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and if so, by whom was it given and what has become of it?

Ansr 6: I did receive a discharge from Captain Elisha Bell but I did not take particular care of it and by not so doing I lost it.

Quest. 7th State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighborhood and who can testify as to your character for veracity and their belief in your services as a soldier in the revolution.

Anrs 7: I will name James M. Hoge, Hugh. L. Denton and John Telley Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid in open Court S/B. H. Smithson, Clk

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$30.85 per annum commencing March 4, 1831, for service as a private in the cavalry for 5 months in the infantry for 3 months.]
