New Jersey	Be it remembered that on this twenty eighth day of March in the year of our
Monmouth Ss:	Lord, eighteen hundred and eighteen, personally appeared before me William J
Bowne one of th	e Judges of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Monmouth
Joseph Coward	sixty two years of age, who being duly sworn on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God,
deposes and say	s that he this deponent enlisted as a private Soldier in the Army of the United States of
America in the F	Revolutionary War with Great Brittain some time during the year one thousand seven
hundred and se	venty eight in the Company commanded by Capt. Henry Bedkin and in the Independent
Legion, commar	nded by Count Polaski [sic: Kazimierz Pulaski]

This Deponent further saith that he served against the common Enemy in the Independent Legion aforesaid, between twelve and eighteen months and was regularly and honourably discharged, which discharge he this Deponent received in writing which was destroyed by the refugees when his fathers house was robed by them. This Deponent is now a resident in the County of Monmouth and State of New Jersey and further saith that he has no property other than what he obtains by his labour and that he stands in need of assistance for his support and further saith not [signed] Joseph Coward

On the eighteenth day of October eighteen hundred and twenty, State of New Jersey Monmouth County Ss: } personally appeared in Open Court being a court of record and the Inferior Court of Common Pleas in and for the said County of Monmouth, Joseph Coward, aged about sixty six years, a resident in the said County, who being first duly sworn according to law, does on his oath declare that he served in the revolutionary war as follows, that is to say as a private Soldier or Dragoon in Count Pulaskis Legion and continued therein one year agreeably to enlistment and obtained an honorable discharge which was afterwards lost as set forth in his original declaration dated April 5th 1818 and on which he obtained a Pension Certificate No 96. And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain person engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed.

Schedule.

No real or personal estate whatever (except necessary wearing apparel) [signed] Joseph Coward Declarant on his oath aforesaid further saith that he hath no trade or occupation, except that of a Labourer and being a widower without a family (his children being all married or pursuing business for their own maintainance) he has for a number of years past lived with and amongst his children and friends without demanding or receiving from them any important compensation for his Services except his necessary Subsistence.
