[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

District of Maryland Saint Mary's County to wit -

On this 12<sup>th</sup> day of May 1818 before me the subscriber one of the Associate Judges of the first Judicial District of Maryland personally appeared Jessie Powers aged about 57 years a resident of Saint Mary's County Maryland who being by me first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the United States in the revolutionary war.["] That he the said Jesse Powers enlisted in Charles County Maryland in the Company commanded by Capt. John Mitchell of the Maryland line in August 1780 for three years; was marched to Annapolis and was placed under the command of Capt. Alexander Trueman of Col. Adams' [Peter Adams'] Regiment also of the Maryland line. That he continued to serve in the said Corps or in the service of the United States until the \_\_month in the year 1783 when he was discharged from service at Frederick Town Maryland by Capt. Gaither [Henry Gaither]. That he was in the battle of the Siege of York – was on board the Sloop *Porpus* [*Porpoise?*] in her fight down the Chesapeake Bay under the immediate command of Capt. Revellee [Francis Reveley?] acting as Marine Officer – and was wounded in the knee – that after the Siege of York he marched to Charles Town in South Carolina. And that he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support – and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said Services. Sworn to and declared before me the day and year aforesaid

State of Maryland, First Judicial District viz.

On this 11<sup>th</sup> day of August 1820 Jesse Power personally appeared in open Court being a Court of record having unlimited original Jurisdiction with authority to fine & in prison for the said Judicial District, Jesse Power aged about 59 years and a resident of St. Mary's County one of the Counties that is included in said district who being 1<sup>st</sup> duly sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he served in the revolutionary war as follows he enlisted August 1780 in Capt. John Mitchell's Company of the 1<sup>st</sup> Maryland Regiment and in 1783 he was discharged at Frederick Town Maryland, he was at the siege of York, that he made his 1<sup>st</sup> application for a pension from the United States on the 12<sup>th</sup> of May 1818 and the number of his pension certificate is 7678. – And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed. His family is a wife about 35 years old -3children all females one 21, one 18, and 10 years old.

A Schedule of my property my necessary bedding & clothing excepted viz.: 2 mares one six & one fifteen years old, 2 Colts, one three months, the other one one year – two months, 5 head of horned cattle, one [indecipherable word]<sup>2</sup> pigs, 3 shoats, one cart, 3 pots, 5 pewter basons, 1 dozen pewter spoons, 1 dozen earthen plates, 2 ploughs, 2 axes, 1 pair of wedges, 2 tables, one chest, one trunk, 3 boxes, four old barrels, 6 hoes, spider, pan & pot & Tea Kettle. I received as a pension from the State of Maryland \$40 a year.

I am indebted in the sum of \$46.60. There is from \$13.66 or 80 due to me S/ Jesse Power

Auditor's Office Annapolis January 23rd 1819

I certify that it appears that the Pay Roll of the Troops in the Maryland Line that Jesse Powers a private was Discharged on the 19<sup>th</sup> July 1783 and received arrears of Pay from the 1<sup>st</sup> August 1780 to the 15<sup>th</sup> of November 1783.
