Pension application of Nathan Nabors S35534 f22VA Transcribed by Will Graves 1/2/13

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

## State of Kentucky Warren County Sct.

On this 5<sup>th</sup> day of May 1823 personally appeared in open Court (being a court of record in and for said County of Warren) – Nathan alias Nathaniel Nabors, age seventy-nine years resident in said County – Who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows –

I enlisted in the year 1778 in the state of Virginia for eighteen months – served in the 1<sup>st</sup> Virginia Regiment under General Newlenberg or Mulenburgh [Peter Muhlenberg] commander of Brigade under Major Cabell [probably Samuel Jordan Cabell] commander of said Regiment in Captain Clay's Company – the whole of which time I served out, was honorably discharged which discharge is lost. I know not how –

And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed

My occupation is that of a farmer – my ability (from age and infirmity) is such that I am not able to perform labor = my family consist of 12, myself of the age above written, my wife a weakly woman upwards of 50 years old – my oldest son who lives with me age 20 years, but he works for himself – my oldest daughter who lives with me having but one hand aged upwards of 20, eight others, 3 boys & 5 girls, who are not able to do much for my assistance.

I do Certify that in the time of the Revolutionary war I lived about 7 miles from Nathan Neighbors in the State of Virginia and that in the year 1778 in the beginning of that year said

Neighbors enlisted in the regular Service of the United States in one of the Virginia regiments for 18 months and I have all good Reasons to believe that he served his time and was discharged with honor and in good credit. Given under my hand this 5<sup>th</sup> day of April 1823

This day personally appeared before us Justices of the peace for the County of Warren in the State of Kentucky (who in turn time reside & whole court for the County aforesaid) Benjamin Pendleton & made oath that Nathan Nabors enlisted as he believes about the year 1778 for the service of the Continental Army – he further made oath that he knows said Nabors served 18 months or 2 years and some of the Virginia regiments, he thinks the first – This deponent never heard anything said to induce him to believe that said Nabors did not obtain an Honorable discharge – this deponent believes he did though he never saw it – this deponent states that said Nabors was always esteemed a faithful & valiant soldier.
