Washington Circuit Sct:

On this 17 day of August 1820 personally appeared in open court (being a court of record for the said County), George Fielder, aged about seventy four years old resident in Washington County and in the State aforesaid who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follow. To wit: he was inlisted [sic] about the year 1776 in the state of Virginia in Capt Joseph Crockett Company in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Morgan *formerly* of ______ [blank in original] that he received a discharge in Frederick Town Maryland. That his pension certificate is number 16462. And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18 day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my estate or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or security contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income whatsoever other than as contained in the foregoing following schedule hereto annexed.

I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

These are to Certify that George Fielder Formally a Soldier in the 5th Virginia Regiment has dutifully and faithfully served the Term of years for which he was Enlisted in Consequence of which and at his own Request he is hereby discharged from any further Service in the Army of the United States and permitted to Returned to his home free & unmolested he having Received

all his Bounty pay & Clothing & Deficiencies of pay & Clothing, in full of all allowances & provision made by the Congress for their Troops – his receipt for which is on the back hereof. Given under my hand at Philadelphia this 28th day of January 1780
