## Pension application of Golden Bishop S37763 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

## Georgia, Newton County

On this eleventh day of July in the year 1825, personally appeared in open court (it being the honorable the Inferior Court for said County & a court of record), Golden Bishop, resident in said County aged about Seventy Seven years who being first duly sworn, according to law, doth on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the acts of Congress, of the 18<sup>th</sup> of March 1818, & the first of May 1820, that he the said Golden Bishop enlisted for the term of two years if the war should continue so long on the \_\_ day of \_\_ in the year 1781 or 1782 in the State of Georgia in the company in which \_\_ Hardwick was Sergeant (Captain's name not recollected), \_\_ Perry was adjutant. John Habbersham [John Habersham] Major of the Battalion – in the line of the State of Georgia on the United States Continental establishment; that he continued to serve in said Corps until December 1783 when he was discharged from the service in Savannah in the State of Georgia, that he hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension, except the present, & [declares] that his name is not on the roll of any State, except but the State of Georgia; and that his only reason for not making an earlier application for a pension is that he was ignorant of the said provisions made by the said acts of Congress. And in furtherance of the act of the first of May, 1820, I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of An Act of Congress entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval Service of the United States in the Revolutionary War," passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income, whatever, that I am by occupation a farmer, but from old age & infirmity unable to pursue it, that I have no family residing with me – that I have children, but none able to contribute to my Support only as I labor for them – that I am in such indigent circumstances, as to be unable to support myself, without the aid of the government, except by public or private charity. That since the 18<sup>th</sup> March 1818, the only property I have around excepting my wearing apparel, is one mare & she died long since.

Sworn to, & declared on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of July 1825 before the honorable, the Inferior Court for said County of Newton.

IN Pursuance of a Proclamation issued by his Excellency, WASHINGTON, Esquire, Commander in Chief of of the United States of America, bearing Date the 4th Day ber last, the Bearer hereof, in the said Battalion, is discharged from the same, he having to serve for two Years, if the War should continue so lorgagement he has suffilled as a good and faithful Soldier.

Given at Savannah, in Ge December, 1783.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$8 per month commencing July 11, 1825 for service as a private for 2 years in the Georgia Continental line.]
