## Pension application of William Hutcherson S38054 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

At a Court held for Spotsylvania County [Virginia] the 6<sup>th</sup> day of April 1818

William Hutcherson of Spotsylvania County came into Court and declared on Oath that he enlisted in a Company of regulars commanded by Oliver Towles on the 28<sup>th</sup> of January 1776 for the term of two years, and having duly served the time aforesaid was discharged at Valley Forge by General George Weedon the then Commanding Officer of the 6<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment on Continental establishment. The said Hutcherson also declared on oath that from his reduced Circumstances he needs the assistance of his country for support – Major Benjamin Alsop <sup>1</sup> also came into Court and made oath that he knows that William Hutcherson's statement to be substantially true – as he was a soldier in the same Company and was discharged by General Weedon at the same time. It is ordered to be certified to the Secretary of War that it appears to the satisfaction of the Court that the said Hutcherson served in the revolutionary war from the foregoing evidence and from the certificate of Lieutenant Colonel Oliver Towles produced to the court.

Being appointed to the Command of a Company of Regulars raised in the County of Spotsylvania in the month of January 1776 William Hutcherson of the said County enlisted with me as a Soldier on the 28<sup>th</sup> day of the year and month aforementioned and continued in the Service of the United States in the capacity of a Soldier for two years being the term of his enlistment when he was duly discharged by the then Commanding Officer of the sixth Virginia Regiment on Continental establishment then encamped in Winter Quarters at Valley Forge at that time & at the conclusion of the War I was a Lieutenant Colonel in the Virginia line on the establishment aforementioned. Certified from under my Hand this the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of October 1795 and in the 20<sup>th</sup> year of the Independence of the United States.

At a Court held for Spotsylvania County the 5<sup>th</sup> day of June 1820 District of Virginia Sct.

On the 5<sup>th</sup> day of June 1820 personally appeared in Open Court being a Court of record by the laws of the state William Hutcherson aged seventy-two years resident in Spotsylvania County in said District who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he served in the revolutionary war as follows. That on or about the 28<sup>th</sup> day of January 1776 he enlisted as a soldier for the term of two years in Captain Oliver Towles Company of the 6<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment commanded by Colonel Buckner [Mordecai Buckner] of the Virginia line, that he faithfully served his time out and was discharged by General Weedon at Valley Forge on or about the 31<sup>st</sup> of January 1778, his Original declaration was made before the Court of Spotsylvania County in the State aforesaid on the 6<sup>th</sup> day of April 1818 his pension certificate is No. 312 and dated the 29<sup>th</sup> day of April 1818 and I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed to wit; a Cow and calf, a Yearling, a sow and three shoats; two axes, four hoes and an old gun. My occupation is cultivating a small spot of land about my cabin which Mr. Ellev lets me have free of rent. As to my family my sister Suckey Hutcherson aged about fifty-seven years We lived

together and hold the property above named Jointly. There is a woman with us Sarah Yates about forty-five years of age. She works for herself or we all work in common for a support.
