Pension application of Andrew McCausland S38199 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

District of Columbia Sct.

On this 15 day of July 1819 before me the subscriber one of the Judges of the circuit court of the United States for the said district, personally appeared Andrew McCausland, aged 62 years, resident in the State of Georgia, but now in Washington in said district, who by me being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made the late act of Congress entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval Service of the United States in the revolutionary war;" That he the said Andrew McCausland was appointed a Lieutenant of infantry on the 14th day of September 1777 in the company commanded by Captain Robert Semple [Robert Sample of the Pennsylvania line?] of the 6th Virginia Regiment, Virginia line, on Continental establishment; that he continued to serve in the said Regiment until the end of the revolutionary war, when the Army was disbanded at Morris Town [Morristown], State of New Jersey, having served of [sic] continued & uninterrupted service upwards of four years & six months; that he was in the battles of Trenton [December 26, 1776], German Town [Germantown, October 4, 1777], Monmouth [June 28, 1778], Stony Point [July 16, 1779], Camden, Brandywine [September 11, 1777] (having received a wound in each of the battles of German Town, Brandywine and Camden) and in several skirmishes – that he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support, and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services, having lost his commission.

Sworn to, and declared before me, the day and year aforesaid.

I Buckner Thruston Judge &c as aforesaid, do certify, that it appears to my satisfaction, that the said Andrew McCausland did serve in the revolutionary war as stated in the preceding declaration against the common enemy; and I now transmit the proceedings and testimony taken and had before me to the Secretary of the Department of War, pursuant to the directions of the aforesaid act of Congress. I also certify that it appears satisfactorily to me, that the said Andrew McCausland is in reduced circumstances.

District of Virginia SS

on this 9th day of August 1820, personally appeared in open court being a court of record for the County of Henrico late Lieutenant Andrew McCausland aged 65 years, a resident in the County of Henrico in said district, who being first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, declare that he served in the revolutionary war as follows: in the 10th Pennsylvania Regiment in Captain Robert Samples Company on the Continental line in the Revolutionary war and the date of his original declaration was dated the 15th day of July 1819 and that his pension Certificate is numbered a piece of Paper being Pasted over the Number it could not be ascertained and I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed and that he has no real personal estate and that his occupation has been a Soldier that his ability is insufficient to perform that duty and that he has no family and stands in need of the assistance of his Country for support

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[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$20 per month commencing July 15th, 1819 for service as a Lieutenant for 6 years in the Virginia Continental line.]
