## Pension application of John Phillips S39010 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

On this day John Phillips came into Court and filed his affidavit for his pension in the words and figures following to wit State of Tennessee Lawrence County Court October Term 1822: On the Seventh day of October 1822 personally appeared in open court being a court of record for the County and State aforesaid John Phillips aged about Seventy years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the provisions of the act of Congress of the 18th March 1818 and first of May 1820, that the said Philips enlisted for 3 years in the month of October 1776 in the State of North Carolina in the Company commanded by Captain Abraham Shepherd [Abraham Sheppard, Jr.] in the 10th Regiment commanded by Colonel Abraham Shepherd [Abraham Sheppard] in the line of the State of North Carolina that he was afterwards transferred to a company commanded by Major Murphy [sic, probably Hardy Murfree] in the 2nd North Carolina Regiment commanded by Colonel John Patison [sic, probably John Patton or Patten] that he continued to serve in said Company until discharged in the month of October he thinks in November 1777 at the White Planes [sic, White Plains] in the State of Connecticut which he got wet and went to pieces and was lost and he has no Evidence in his power except his own oath that the reason he was discharged before his time of service expired was because he was taken by the rumatic [sic, rheumatic?] pains and rendered unable thereby to serve his country that he was in the Battle of Monmouth bracket June 28, 1778] with the wagons my family consists of myself aged as aforesaid by occupation a farmer infirm by reason of said pains which have ever since followed him and of my wife aged about 70 years unable to help herself so much as to maintain herself and in pursuance of the act of the first of May 1820, I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed— S/ John Philips<sup>1</sup>

I William Hill Secretary of State in & for the State aforesaid do certify that it appears from the musterrolls of the Continental line of this State in the revolutionary War, that John Phillips a private in Captain \_\_ Company of the 10th Regiment was mustered on the first day of September 1777 for 3 years and discharged the 11th September 1778.

Given under my hand at office the date above S/Wm Hill

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$8 per month commencing March 1, 1823, for service as a private for one year in the North Carolina Continental line.]
