## Pension application of Edward Walker S41302 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

## Charles City County State of Virginia to wit:

On this 18th day of June 1818 before us the Subscribers Justices of the Peace and Justices of the County Court of Charles City, personally appears Edward Walker aged 55 years resident in the County aforesaid who being by us first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War:" that he the said Edward Walker enlisted at West Point in the County of King William in the State of Virginia in the fall of the year 1778 in the troop of cavalry commanded by Captain John Armong (a Frenchman) of Colonel George Dabney's Regiment, that he continued to serve in said Corps until the end of the war, when he was discharged from service at Richmond in the State of Virginia; that he was in the battle at Guilford courthouse and at the siege of Little York, and that he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need of the aid of his country for support; and that he has no other evidence in his power of his said services besides the accompanying discharge.

Sworn to before us the day and year aforesaid.

State of Virginia Charles City County to wit

On this 19th day of October in the year 1820, personally appeared before us Justices of the peace & Judges of the County Court of Charles City Edward Walker resident in the County of Charles City in the State of Virginia aged fifty-seven years who being first duly sworn on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the Act of Congress entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States during the Revolutionary War."

That he the said Edward Walker entered the service of the United States at West Point in the County of King William in the State of Virginia in the Spring of the year 1779 in the company of cavalry commanded by Captain Armstrong in the second Troop under the command of Colonel George Dabney on Continental establishment. That he continued to serve in said Corps until after the Siege of Little York when he was discharged from service in the City of Richmond in the State of Virginia, as will more fully appear by reference to the discharge heretofore forwarded to the pension office in Washington City. That he was in the battle of Guilford, and at the Siege of York, and that he has no other evidence in his power other than that heretofore forwarded. That he has heretofore received a pension Certificate from the War Department which bears date of the \_\_ day of \_\_ in the year \_\_ and numbered \_\_. And in pursuance of the act of the first of May 1820, I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed viz. 18 acres of land, one cow, 10 hogs, 4 rush bottomed chairs, 2 pine chest, one iron pot, one Dutch oven, one water pail, one noggin, one tub, one table, one pair of tongs and shovel

that he is by profession a farmer and a resident of the County of Charles City in the State aforesaid, but from old age and infirmity cannot endure hard labor, that his family consists of a son of age, a female also of age and her infant child 2 years old. Sworn to and declared before us this 19th day of October 1820.
