State of North Carolina Currituck County: County Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions August term 1818

Personally appeared in open Court William Beasly and being duly sworn, deposeth that he enlisted as a twelve months man in the Continental Army, under Capt. William Goodman whose company was attached to the first North Carolina Regiment commanded by Col. Redding Blount, that he was in the Battle of Eutaw Springs, that he served twelve months the time for which he enlisted, that he received a discharge signed by Major Hardy Murfree and that being now infirm and aged he stands in need of the act of Congress made for the relief of Soldiers of the Revolution.

Personally appeared in open Court Hosey Bald [sic, Hosea Ball] and being duly sworn, deposeth, that he well knows William Beasely and that he enlisted in the Continental Army and that he served as a soldier in the same for twelve months and that he was in the Battle of Eutaw Springs; and that he knows him to be poor and in indigent circumstances.

State of North Carolina, Secretary's Office 27th September 1821 I William Hill Secretary of State in & for the State aforesaid, do hereby Certify, that it appears from the musterrolls of the Continental line of this State in the revolutionary war, that William Beesley a Corpl. in Capt. Bailey's Company of the 10th Regiment was mustered on the 17th May 1781, for twelve months, and that his time was out on the 17th May 1782 and that William Beesley a private in Capt. Jones's Company of the 10th Regiment was mustered on the 2nd January 1782 for 12 months nothing said of his discharge &c

State of North Carolina Currituck County: On this 27th day of May 1822 Personally appeared in open Court (it being a Court of record) for the County of Currituck, William Beasely aged sixty-three years, who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the acts of Congress of 18th March 1818

and 1st May 1820 that he the said William Beasely enlisted for the term of twelve months on the 20th day of May in the year '80 or '81 in the State of North Carolina in Currituck County in the company commanded by Capt. William Goodman in the Regiment commanded by Col. Hardy Murfree in the line of the State of North Carolina on the Continental Establishment that he continued to serve in the said Corps until the 26th day of June when he was discharged from said Service at Edenton in the County of Chowan North Carolina by Capt. Benjamin Bailey

That he was in the Battle of the Eutaw Springs and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his services except the affidavit of Hosea Ball¹

And in pursuance of the act of the 1st of May 1820, I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed

William Beasly age 63 Nancy Beasly wife 41 daughter Elvy Beasly a 17 son Oliver Beasly age 12 daughter Oliff Beasly age 10 do Wealthy Beasly aged 5 by occupation a card winder but little unable to pursue my calling my place of residence is Currituck County North Carolina
