Pension application of Moses Powers S41963 Transcribed by Will Graves f11NC rev'd 3/3/17

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of North Carolina, Halifax County

Moses Powers came before me J. J. Daniel one of the Judges of the State aforesaid and being sworn deposeth & states that he was a Soldier in the Continental line of Infantry during the revolutionary War, he entered the Service in March 1781 and continued his time out Viz., twelve months, and was discharged in April 1782 at Bacon's Bridge in South Carolina by Captain Prevard [sic, Alexander Brevard]. The said Moses States that he was under a Captain Smith [Robert Smith] when he entered the Service & after the surrender of Augusta in Georgia he was placed under Captain Alexander Brevard – he belonged to the 2nd Battalion commanded by Major Pink Eaton [Pinkethman Eaton]— Eaton was killed at Augusta & Colonel Ashe [Major John Baptiste Ashe?] took command. The Said Moses States that he was in four battles, Santee, two at Augusta, & John's Island [January 12-15, 1782]. The Said Moses States that he is 65 or 66 years old he has no property of any kind, is now blind & stands in need of the assistance of his Country for support – he says his Discharge was sent to the Commissioners of Army Accounts & it has never been returned. He prays the benefit of the act of Congress for the relief of Soldiers in the revolutionary War.

from the muster rolls of the Continental line of this State for the Revolutionary war, that Moses Powers a private in Captain Brevard's Company of the 10th Regiment³ was mustered on the __ [blank in original] day of __ [blank in original] and left the service on the 12th of April 1782. On this 24th day of August 1820, personally appeared in open Court (as being a court of record for the Said District, Circuit, County or Corporation, as the Case may be), Moses Powers aged 66 years, residence in Halifax County in Said District (Circuit, County or Corporation) who being first duly Sworn, according to Law, doth on his oath declare that he Served in the revolutionary war as follows. That he was attached as a private to the Infantry of the North Carolina line 2nd Battalion that he has received no pension but that by a certificate of the War Office dated the 18th of October 1890, he is entitled to a pension of Eight dollars per month commencing the 17th of August 1819.

And I do solemnly Swear (or affirm, as the case may be) that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818: and that I have not since that time: by gift, Sale, or in any manner disposed of my property, or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled an act to provide for Sir persons engaged in the Land and naval Service of the United States, in the revolutionary war, passed on the 18th day of March 1818: and that I have not nor has any person in Trust for me, any property or Securities, Contracts or debts due to me: nor have I any income, that he is worth nothing but his wearing apparel, that he has no occupation because he is the blind and no ability to pursue any and that he is in Such indigent Circumstances as to be unable to Support himself without the assistance of his Country, or private charity.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$8 per month commencing August 17th, 1819, for services as a private in the North Carolina Continental line for 12 months.]
