Pension application of William Jones S4442 Transcribed by Will Graves f21NC 11/10/08: rev'd 3/14/16

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Tennessee, Smith County Court, August Term A.D. 1832

On this 28 day of August 1832 William Jones a resident of the County & State aforesaid aged about Seventy years personally appeared before John Chambers, Solomon McMurray, William Gouit [?] who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832.

The applicant William Jones states that he entered the Service in the revolutionary war in Caswell County North Carolina in the early part of the war, but what year is not recollected, first under the command of Captain Wm White as a volunteer whose name is now forgotten on a tour of five three-months, was in no engagement the Colonel commanding was Colonel William Moore James Saunders And Gen. Major Thomas Harrison Mr. James Peterson was in a different company but the same Regiment. Was in no engagement -- received no written discharge - knows of no one now living by which I can prove this first tour.

Also served a five months tour as a volunteer in the State of North Carolina & from Caswell County Was commanded by Captain William White; the Colonel commanding was Colonel James Saunders, and Major Thomas Harrison & Major George Moore was field officers of our Regiment; this campaign was as well as recollected in the latter part of 1778 and the first of 1779 Philip Day & John Knight<sup>3</sup> now Smith County was out at the same time & can testify to my performing this tour of five months.

The applicant further states that he served a tour of twelve months in the State of North Carolina and was attached to a company commanded by Captain Tilmon Dixon [sic, Tilghman Dixon]; one of the Lieutenants was Will Saunders, both Dixon & Saunders died[?] in this County: -- Major Hall Dixon [sic, Hal or Henry Dixon] belonged to the same Regiment, and Colonel \_\_ Armstrong commanded the Regiment. Was in the battle at Gates defeat in Camden South Carolina [Battle of Camden, August 15-16, 1780]. That he was discharged at Bacon's Bridge South Carolina the discharge has become worn out & destroyed. Has no written evidence and Support of this claim nor does he know of any person now living by whom he can prove this term of twelve months.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatsoever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

This day being the \_\_ day of August 1832 Philip Day & John Knight, personally appeared in open court, and being first duly sworn, stated that they have been acquainted with William Jones who signed & was sworn to the above declaration; that they was with said Jones in the five months tour spoken of in the declaration, and from their acquaintance with him have no hesitation in saying that they believe he served the whole time as stated in his declaration.

I William Hill Secretary of State in and for the State aforesaid, do certify, that it appears from the musterrolls of the Continental line of this State in the revolutionary war that William Jones a private Soldier in Captain Yarborough's company of the 10th Regiment enlisted in 1781 for 12 months, and left the service on the 22nd day of May 1782.

Given under my hand this 23rd day of April 1833. S/Wm Hill

[Facts in file: Veteran died March 27, 1836 in Smith County, Tenn. there is reference to the veteran having 6 children but Thomas B Jones a resident of Carthage Tennessee in 1837 is the only one whose name appears in this file. The file contains no other family data]

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$73.33 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831, for service as a private for 22 months in the North Carolina militia and Continental line.]
