## Pension application of Michael Hoover S5560 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Virginia, Pendleton County (to wit)

On this 7<sup>th</sup> day of November 1832 personally appeared before the Court of Pendleton, now sitting, Michael Hoover a Resident of the South fork, a branch of the Potomac, in the County of Pendleton & State of Virginia, aged Seventy-nine years, Who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832, That he entered the Service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated, first tour of three months (drafted) and served under Captain Robert Davis, Ensign Francis Evick [?]<sup>1</sup>, in an expedition against the Indians on the West fork of the Monongahela River in the Northwestern part of Virginia – Second Tour of three months (Drafted) and marched to Richmond in Virginia and was attached to another Company, the name of the officers of which he does not now recollect – he thinks he was Discharged some little time before the Expiration of said three months – third tour, called & know [known] by the name of twenty days draft, on this Expedition he was ordered to furnish his own horse and when the Company was under marching orders and about to set out for Richmond, he was then Detailed by Captain Robert Davis to go in pursuit of a Gang of Tories, in which service they were engaged, he thinks about three weeks; he says the [they] made a few captives who were again set at liberty by their giving up their arms – he says he was born on the South fork about twelve miles from where he now lives, he says he has no Documentary Evidence to offer in support of his Claim.

He hereby relinquishes every Claim to a pension or annuity except the present, and Declares that his name is not on the pension Roll of the agency of any State.

Virginia Pendleton County to wit

On this 7<sup>th</sup> day of November 1832, Palser Hammer<sup>2</sup> came before the Subscriber a Justice of the peace for the County and made oath that he has read Michael Hoover's Declaration made to obtain a pension under the late act of Congress & that he well recollects of serving a 3 months Tour of duty in the year 1778 during the Revolutionary war, with the said Hoover against the Indians in Captain R. Davis Company of militia on the waters of the Monongahela & that

Francis Evick was Lieutenant in said company & that at the time of said service, what is now Pendleton County was of Augusta County.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$20 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831, for service as a private in the Virginia militia for 6 months.]
