## **Southern Campaign American Revolution Pension Statements & Rosters**

Pension application of James Omohundro S5860 Transcribed by Will Graves f14VA 12/24/12

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Virginia Charlotte County to wit

On this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of December 1832 personally appeared before the County Court of Charlotte James Omohundro (a resident of the County and State aforesaid) aged 76 [last digit unclear could be 71] years, who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832. That on the 9<sup>th</sup> day of February 1776 in the County of Westmoreland (his then residence) he enlisted in the Army of the United States for two years with Captain Richard Bernard or as he was called by the soldiers, Barnett and served in the 5<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment on the Continental establishment. The deponent cannot now certainly state, who was the commanding Officer of the Regiment when he enlisted, but he thinks it was Colonel Ball or Colonel Josiah Parker. Neither can he state who were the Majors. His Captain resigned in Williamsburg; from whence the deponent and the other soldiers proceeded to little York – and from thence by water to the head of Elk [River] – Thence to Wilmington [Delaware] where the deponent was inoculated with the small Pox. They then proceeded to Philadelphia and then to Trenton, where Henry Fauntleroy (who was afterwards killed in battle<sup>2</sup>) was appointed to the command of the company to which the deponent belonged. From Trenton the Army was marched about in New Jersey, but the deponent cannot name the places through which they passed. They were finally stationed at the Valley Forge in Pennsylvania. The small Pox had so bad and effect on the deponent's health that he was in neither of the battles fought by the Army during the time of his service. When the Hessians were taken at Trenton [December 26, 1776] the deponent was ill in the hospital, and when the battles of Germantown [October 4, 1777] and Brandywine [September 11, 1777] took place the deponent had returned home under permit to recruit his health. He rejoined the Army in the fall of the year 1777 at the Valley Forge, where he remained stationed until his time expired, which was on the 9<sup>th</sup> of February 1778. He then and there received his discharge but deeming it of no consequence after the war ended knows not what became of it.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or an annuity except the present, and he declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency of any State. Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid.

This is to certify that I Richard O Mohondro [sic] of Campbell County Virginia am well acquainted with James O Mohondro [sic] from our infancy and that he enlisted in the Revolutionary war in the Regular service under Captain Richard Barnett of Westmoreland County for the term of 2 years and that he served his term of 2 years as a soldier. Given under my hand this 13<sup>th</sup> day of September 1832.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$80 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831, for service as a private for 2 years in the Virginia service.]
