Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

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State of North Carolina Rowan County}

On this 19th day of November 1832 personally appeared in open Court before the Magistrates who are Judges of the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions for Rowan County the same being a Court of Record, William Lucky [sic] a resident of said County aged seventy five years, who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832. That he has no record of his age -- that he was born and raised in the said County of Rowan.

That he entered the service of the United States as a drafted Soldier in said County in the Company of Capt. Johnson Sloan and marched to Charleston in South Carolina under Col. Hamright [Frederick Hambright] & Col. Little [Archibald Lytle] that this tour of service lasted three months this happened immediately after the capture of Charleston<sup>1</sup> and as he believes in the year 1780. That he afterwards volunteered in a rifle company in said company commanded by Thomas Cowan in the Regiment of Col. William R. Davie stationed near Charlotte in North Carolina, where he served three months -- that he was what was called a minute man and was frequently out as a soldier for a few days at a time making in all about three months -- and was at the Battle of Ramsour's Mill<sup>2</sup> in Lincoln County -- and was taken sick with the smallpox & was removed from the camp immediately before the battle of Guilford.<sup>3</sup> He hereby relinquishes all and every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State to his knowledge --

That he has no documentary evidence of his service; he refers to his neighbors James Graham<sup>4</sup> & Benjamin Knox<sup>5</sup> -- who served with him in the Army & are able to testify to his services & character.

In the absence of any regular Clergyman We James Graham & Benjamin Knox Residing in Rowan County State of North Carolina do hereby certify that we are well acquainted with William Lucky who has signed and sworn to the foregoing declaration, that we believe him to be 75 years of age that we served with him part of the time by him mentioned and having full confidence in his integrity and veracity -- believe that he served as he states.

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The foregoing Declaration and certificates having been returned by the War Department with objections. The applicant William Luckie appeared before Jacob Krider an acting Justice of the Peace in & for Rowan County North Carolina and on oath offered the following amendment and explanation of his said Declaration. That he served as a private soldier in Capt. Sloan's company for three months in the year 1780. That he served as a private Soldier in Capt. Cowan's Rifle company for three months as he believes in the same year. That the time of his service as a minute man and private Soldier was at least three months. That the only regular clergyman acquainted with him died on a short time before he made this declaration and he consequently could not procure a clergyman's certificate.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$20 per annum commencing March 4th, 1831 for 6 months service in the revolution.]
