## Pension application of Robert Mansfield S7185 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

## State of Virginia, Sct.

On this 24 day of September 1832 personally appeared in Open Court before the Justices of the County Court of Orange now sitting Robert Mansfield a resident of the County and State aforesaid aged 70 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832. That he entered the service of the United States under the following officers viz. I enlisted in the service of the revolution on the 11<sup>th</sup> of March 1779 under Captain Garland Berley [Garland Burnley or Burley], Thomas Porter Lieutenant, at that time being a resident of the County of Albemarle and State aforesaid and continued in the service under the same officers until April 11<sup>th</sup> 1781 at which time I obtained a discharge at Winchester Frederick County Virginia. I then returned home remained but a short time – I was then drafted in the spring of 1781 for a tour of two months, and served the aforesaid two months under the command of Captain Henry Burke, Colonel Reuben Lindsay of Albemarle, first Regiment of General Lawson's [Robert Lawson's] brigade, and was discharged at Morbins Hills [Malvern Hills] in the date 1781 – I then returned home and remained but a short time – I then substituted myself for a term of two months and marched to the Siege of York and capture of Cornwallis [October 19, 1781], from thence to Nolan's ferry as a guard at this place my services in did. I do hereby relinquish every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declare that my name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.
