Pension application of James McCulloch (McCullock) S7201 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of North Carolina Orange County

On this the 14th day of September A.D. 1832 -- This day came personally before Mr. Joseph D. Hughes one of the Justices of the peace for the County aforesaid James McCulloch & made oath according to law -- that he is about 94 years of age, & that he entered the Continental Services as a private Soldier under the command of Capt. Alfred Moore in the year 1775 in the month of September & marched by the way of Fayetteville North Carolina to Wilmington & from thence to Barney's Creek & there took up winter quarters & was discharged the 13th of Marched 1776 in Wilmington by Col. James Moore having served a 6 months tour as appears by written discharge. Again he was drafted into the Service under the command of Capt. Richard Christmas & served as 1st Sgt. in the Company marched from Hillsboro NC, about the month of January 1780 by the way of Salisbury North Carolina & from thence to Charleston South Carolina where he continued in service until the Siege of said place, when he was taken prisoner [Charleston South Carolina fell to the British on May 12, 1780] & was paroled as a prisoner of war, on the 19th day of May A.D. 1780 as will appear by parole sent on -- field officers, Col. Philip Taylor. This deponent resided in the County of Orange North Carolina at the time he enlisted also at the time he was drafted as aforesaid, this deponent was born in Lancaster County & State of Pennsylvania, he has no record of his age -- he removed with his parents to Orange County North Carolina where he has resided ever since. This did declarant received a discharge from the Service in which he was for a six months tour -- also a parole as a prisoner of war, This declarant is known to James Clark Esquire Col. Joseph Moore Andrew McBroom Esquire & David Allison Esquire in his neighborhood & he has no Documentary evidence of his services as aforesaid except a discharge for a six months tour & a paroled as a prisoner of war -- nor does he know any person or persons whose testimony he can procure, who can testify to his services. This declarant hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, & declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the Agency of any State so far as he hath knowledge.



I do hereby acknowledge myself to be a Prisoner of War, upon my Parole, to his Excellency Sir Henry Clinton, and that I am hereby engaged until I shall be exchanged, or otherwise released there from, to remain on my plantation in the County of Orange and State of North Carolina and that I shall not in the mean Time do, or cause any Same to be done, prejudicial to the Success of His Majesty's Arms, or have Intercourse or hold Correspondence with his Enemies; and that upon a Summons from his Excellency, or other Person having Authority thereto, that I will surrender myself to him or them at such Time and Place as I shall hereafter be required. Witness my hand this 19th Day of May 1780

[Joseph McCulloch later testified that his father died leaving no widow but survived by the following children: John, William, Joseph, Alexander, James and Elizabeth McCulloch.]

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$40 per annum commencing March 4th, 1831, for service as a private for twelve months in the North Carolina Continental line. The actual certificate was issued in favor of the children of the veteran who died June 17, 1833.]
