[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

County of Mecklenburg State of Virginia: Sct.

On this 19 day of August 1833 personally appeared before the Court of the aforesaid County James Cunningham a resident of said County & State aforesaid aged 69 – years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed the 7th day of June 1832. That he joined the Company of Captain Reuben Vaughan [also spelled Reuben Vaughn] of the County of Mecklenburg State of Virginia the commencement of the year 1779 – that is the beginning of January of that year & marched under him – John Holmes Lieutenant in said Company, William Holloway Sergeant. That they marched from the said County of Mecklenburg to the Courthouse of the County of Granville State of North Carolina where they joined Colonel David Mason & Lieutenant Colonel Lewis Burwell who commanded the Regiment – from thence we marched to Hillsboro, to Saulsberry [Salisbury], to Charlotte Mecklenburg County North Carolina – thence to Camden South Carolina and thence we marched & joined the main Army commanded by General Lincoln [Benjamin Lincoln] near the river Stono South Carolina where we remained till after the battle fought on said River [Battle of Stono Ferry, June 20, 1779]¹ – (which battle is known by the name of "Stono battle") and in which battle kept as Reinforcements – That about beginning of the month of July 1779 we were discharged – & the discharge of said Cunningham is lost – he hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, & he declares that his name is not on the pension list of the agency of any State – And the said James Cunningham states that he cannot prove these facts by anyone to the best of his knowledge except by William Guy.² That he has resided in the aforesaid County of Mecklenburg since the Revolution till now except one year. S/ James Cunningham, X his mark

Mecklenburg County Va to wit

This day William Guy an old Revolutionary Soldier of Granville County North Carolina came before me a justice of the peace for the County & State aforesaid & made oath that James Cunningham of Mecklenburg Virginia served with him six months in the Army of the Revolution under the command of Captain Reuben Vaughan of Mecklenburg Virginia in the Army marched from Virginia under the command of Colonel David Mason to the State of South Carolina. Given under my hand & seal this 25th day of July 1832

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$20 per annum commencing March 4th, 1831, for service as a private for 6 months in the Virginia militia.]
