[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

Virginia Culpeper County

On this 17th December 1832 personally appeared in open Court Gabriel Gray a resident of the County and State aforesaid in the Seventy first year of his age who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed June __ 1832

Deposeth that he enlisted into the Army of the United States for eighteen months as a Sergeant on the first of July 1780, that he marched to the Main Army under Captain Wallas [sic, Wallace?] an officer of the Regular Army that they joined the Regiment commanded by Colonel Samuel Hawes which Rendezvoused at Hillsboro in North Carolina, they then retreated back to Virginia, and again advanced and met the Army at Guilford court house, had a Battle [March 15, 1781] there with the British Army where this affiant was wounded and afterwards he was in the Battle of Eutaw [Eutaw Springs, September 8, 1781]² and was discharged the 1st January 1782, which discharge is lost. That he served the full time of eighteen months as a sergeant.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present -and he allows that his name is not on the pension roll of any Agency in any State. Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid.
