## Pension application of John Lary<sup>1</sup> S8812 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Virginia County of Shenandoah: SS

On this 13<sup>th</sup> day of August 1832, personally appeared in open court before the court of Shenandoah County, now sitting, John Lary, now residing near New-Market, in the County of Shenandoah, and State of Virginia aged eighty-one years the 9<sup>th</sup> day of March 1832 – who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832. That he enlisted in the Army of the United States in the year \_\_ with Captain Valentine Peyton, in Dumfries, Prince William County Virginia, and served in the third Regiment of the Virginia line, under the following named officers: General Woodford [William Woodford], Colonel Gaskin [Thomas Gaskins], Major Valentine Peyton, Captain Valentine Peyton – Lieutenant Hoy and – General Morgan & General Wayne; he enlisted for three years – and served out the time. Being illiterate, the periods are not recollected – as to when he enlisted, or was discharged & served near Dumfries, in Prince William when he entered the service – He was marched by the Captain into Pennsylvania, where they joined General Woodford. He was engaged in the battles of Brandywine [September 11, 1777], Germantown [October 4, 1777], – Monmouth [June 28, 1778], Sandbar [? or Sandlan?]<sup>2</sup> – and at Trenton [December 26, 1776] at the capture of the Hessians and many skirmishes – After his term of service, he obtained an Honorable discharge, which he thinks, he left with the Auditor at Richmond and was burned. That after his term of service had expired, he volunteered his service for 3 months, and marched under General Wayne [Anthony Wayne], – Captain William Overall & Lieutenant John Overall, from Dumfries Virginia to Yorktown Virginia and was at the capture of Lord Cornwallis [October 19, 1781] –

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or an annuity except the present, and he declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency in any state. Sworn to, and subscribed, the day and year aforesaid.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$80 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831, for service as a private for 3 years in the Virginia service.]
