## Pension application of Richard Pippen S8960 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

On this 10th day of September A.D. 1833 personally appeared in open Court before the Justices of the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions now sitting, Richard Pippen a resident of the County of Franklin and State of North Carolina aforesaid aged about Seventy-Six years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

That he was born in the County of Gloucester State of Virginia on the 8th day of May 1757 according to a register of his age now in the possession of his brother John Pippen. That when he was about ten years of age his father brought him with the rest of his family into this State & settled first in Halifax County whence he removed to Bute County in that portion of which County now forming Franklin, this applicant has resided ever since the Revolution and still continues to reside in the same. That he entered the Revolutionary service in the aforesaid County of Bute where he was then living, as a substitute for Jesse Horn in a company commanded by Captain Britton Harris and under him by Lieutenant Phil Hawkins [sic, Philemon Hawkins] the other officers not recollected, that he was marched down to Kingston [sic, Kinston] in Lenoir County, thence to Elizabeth on the Cape Fear River, thence into South Carolina down to within a few miles of Charleston, where his company was stopped for a few days, he was then marched up the Savannah River opposite Augusta then in the possession of the British, that after a few days the British left Augusta and the Americans crossed over into Georgia and marched down to Briar Creek where they were attacked by the British and completely defeated [Battle of Briar Creek, March 3, 1779]. This applicant made his escape by swimming Briar Creek and the Savannah River, after which he fell in with several other refugees like himself and went to a place called the White House where he found Colonel Thomas Eaton who had escaped from the battle by swimming the River Savannah upon his horse. This applicant was then carried to Purrysburg where he was stationed until his discharge, which he received in writing from the hand of Michael Dent, but he does not recollect by whom it was signed, or what ever became of it, as it has been long since lost. He does not recollect the date of this term of service except as he is informed the date of the Battle of Briar Creek which fixes it until the latter part of the year 1778 and the beginning of 1779. He served in the capacity as a private militia for the full term of six months and expects to prove his service by Jesse Webb<sup>1</sup> and his brother John Pippen.<sup>2</sup> Among the field officers under whom he served he remembers the name of General Ashe [John

Ashe] Colonel Williams (a brave officer) [John Pugh Williams], Colonel Thomas Eaton and Colonel Clinch. He also recollects that after the defeat at Briar Creek, the American forces were under the command of General Bryan [William Bryant]. This Applicant further states that he is not acquainted with any minister of the Gospel who can testify as to his character for veracity and as to his reputation as a revolutionary soldier, but he thinks that many of his neighbors and others will certify as to those facts to wit – Colonel Guston Perry the Sheriff of the County, Smith Patterson, Clerk of the County Court, Colonel Green Ross, and Hardy W. Thorp.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State. September Sessions 1833

State of North Carolina Franklin County} Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions September Term 1833

Jesse Webb personally appeared in open Court and maketh oath that Richard Pippen who has subscribed and sworn to the above declaration entered the militia service in the Revolutionary war in Captain Britton Harris's Company in which he the said Webb also served and that the said Richard Pippen served 6 months in the tour to the South during which the Battle of Briar Creek took place.

This day appeared before me the undersigned one of the Justices of the Peace for the County of Franklin aforesaid, John Pippen who being duly sworn, doth on his oath depose and say that his brother Richard Pippen entered the Revolutionary Service in the same company with himself the said John, and that he served as a private militia man during the whole of the tour to the South in which the battle of Briars Creek [sic, Briar Creek] took place.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$20 per annum commencing March 4, 1831, for service as a private for 6 months in the North Carolina militia.]
