Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

To the Honorable the Members of the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina. –

Your Petitioner would respectfully represent to your Honorable Bodies that his Father John Miles was taken a Prisoner at the battle of the Hanging Rock [August 6, 1780], while engaged in fighting for the liberties of his country under General Sumter [Thomas Sumter], and taken to Camden, and hung August the 24th, A.D. 1780. Your Petitioner would further state that he is informed that an act was passed by the Legislature of this State affording relief to a certain extent to the widows of those who were killed or died in the service of this country during the Revolutionary War, but he has not been able to find any act which would extend to himself, but he would respectfully represent that under the peculiar circumstances of the case he your petitioner might with great justice and propriety be allowed something. Your Petitioner is now very old and infirm and is supported at the poor house in the vicinity of Columbia. – As your petitioner while very young, was left an orphan in consequence of losing his father in the service of his country, and he as he is now very old and infirm, your petitioner prays that you may for the few years remaining of his life, allow him a small pension & your petitioner will ever pray &c
