Pension application of John Catlett Garrett W10046 Transcribed by Will Graves Elizabeth Garrett f52SC 9/14/08 rev'd 7/28/15 & 4/19/21

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

State of South Carolina, Edgefield District

On this the third day of January A.D. 1854, personally appeared before me, Henry T. Wright, Judge of the Court of Ordinary for the District and State aforesaid Thomas Garrett a resident of the district and State aforesaid and the son and only child of Elizabeth & Catlet Garrett both deceased, who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the Act of Congress passed July 7th 1838, entitled: "An Act granting half pay & pensions to certain widows:" That he is the only living child of Elizabeth Garrett deceased, who was the widow of Catlet Garrett, who was a private in the Revolutionary Army in the militia of the State of South Carolina and in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Leroy Hammond, as by reference to the enclosed certificate will more fully appear. He further declares that his mother and father were married on the __ day of __ A. D. __; that his father the said Catlet Garrett died on the 9th day of February A.D. 1833; and that his mother, the aforesaid Elizabeth Garrett died on the 13th day of October A.D. 1843; and that neither his father nor mother received any pension in their lifetime, nor were they applicants for a pension; and that his mother was the widow of Catlet Garrett at the time of her death. Sworn to and subscribed on the day and year above written before me. The words "time of her death," having been first interlined.

State of South Carolina, Edgefield District

Personally appeared before me Mrs. Mary Hammond an aged and highly respectable resident of this District, who being first duly and regularly sworn according to law, deposes as follows viz. That her age is about 77 years. That she was well acquainted with both Catlet Garrett and Elizabeth his wife the former having been her half brother, and both of them were near neighbors for more than 50 years and until the time of their respective deaths. That Catlet Garrett and Elizabeth his wife (whose maiden name was Ware) were married shortly after the close of the Revolutionary War she was present at their marriage but was too small to recollect the date, but from the best of her recollection it must have been previous to the year 1794, and that their oldest child Robert if now alive would be upwards of 60 years of age. This deponent has no precise and positive knowledge herself of the fact that the said Catlet Garrett was a soldier

in the Revolutionary War, except that it was generally spoken of and believed in the family and never doubted by any one. That she had frequently heard it spoken of his having received a wound while doing duty in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Le Roy Hammond of the Militia of this State, and that she has every reason for believing that he is the Identical person who performed the service as specified in the transcript from the books of the Comptroller Generals office which accompanies this paper. Deponent further says that all of the children of the said Catlet and Elizabeth Garrett are dead, but Thomas Garrett and that he is there only surviving child. Deponent further states that she never knew or heard of any other Catlet Garrett.

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

[p 27: Abiah Morgan, 88 years old as of 27th October next gave an affidavit dated April 7, 1855, in support of the claim of Thomas Garrett saying he knows of his own knowledge that Catlett

Garrett served in the Revolution under Col. Leroy Hammond, but he does say he served with Garrett and Morgan was not himself a pensioner on the federal rolls. The affiant signed his affidavit with his mark.]

[p 45: On January 31, 1854 in Edgefield District South Carolina, Demcy Bussey Senior, 87, gave testimony that he was intimately acquainted with both Catlett and Elizabeth Garrett; that her maiden name was Elizabeth Ware; that they were married shortly after the Revolutionary war and he is certain prior to 1794; that Catlett Garrett was a revolutionary war soldier and reputed as such in the neighborhood; That the Affiant Heard Garrett speak of having been wounded while in the South Carolina militia.

Demey Bufsey Sen

[Veteran's son, only surviving child and sole surviving heir was granted a sum equal to the pension due his father at the rate of \$43.55 per annum commencing March 4th, 1831 and ending February 9, 1833 when the veteran died. The pension was based on the veteran's service as a private for 13 months and 2 days in the South Carolina militia. His widow's son and heir was granted a sum equal to the pension due his mother as the widow of veteran in a like amount commencing March 4th, 1836 and ending Oct. 13, 1843 when she died.]
