Pension Application of Francis Arnold W106

State of Tennessee } Sept'r 12th 1818 White County Sct }

This Day before me Parry W Humphreys one of the Judges of the Circuit Court for the State & County aforesaid Now presiding in the 3rd Judicial Circuit Court Francis Arnold an inhabitant in said County aged 62 years who being by me first duly sworn the truth to declare & speak relative to his services in the army of the United States in the time of the revalutionary war with a view to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land & Naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war Declares & says that about a year (as well as he remembers) before the Battle of Monmouth [28 Jun 1778] at a place called New market in the County of Spotsylvania in Virginia, he enlisted with a recruiting officer by the name of Miner as a soldier in the Army of the United States on continental establishment [see endnote] for the term of 3 years he was marched to Williamsburgh [sic: Williamsburg] & pun under the Command of a Capt'n whose name he thinks was Quarles of the 2nd Virginia Regiment of which Charles Dabney was Colonel or Lieutenant Colo & William Brent afterward Colo. of the 1st Regiment commanded them a short time as he believes as Colo. but of these things he has but an indistinct recollection by reason of the great laps of time but he served out his time of three years & was discharged at falmouth in Va by the Maj'r John Lee of the 2nd Regiment under whom he had served his discharge he has lost long since & he has no other evidence of his service in his power to produce other than the affidavit of Charles Kennedy esq'r. hereto annexed he further says that he has no means of subsistance but by his labour & which he is unable to perform by his having lost in a great degree the use of one of his arms & his situation & circumstances in life are such & so reduced as to require assistance from his country support & he therefor applys for the benefit of the provisions of the said act of Congress -Francis hisXmark Arnold

State of Tennessee } On his 8th day of September in the year 1826 personally appeared in Open White County Court, in the Honorable Circuit Court being a Court of Record for said County in the third Judicial Circuit in said state, Francis Arnold a resident of said County aged 68 years in January last who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his Oath make the following Declaration - in order to obtain the provision made by the Acts of Congress of the 18th March 1818 and of the 1st May 1820. The said Francis Arnold enlisted as a private soldier for the term of three years in the Winter or Spring in the year of Our Lord 1777, within the state of Virginia in the Company Comanded by Captain Thomas Minor, afterwards by Captain [William] Long as he thinks in the Regiment Commanded by Colonel Charles Dabney in the line of the state of Virginia in the second Regiment of the Virginia Continental establishment, that he continued to serve in said Corps until the expiration of the three years for which he enlisted, when he was discharged in 1780 from the service in Falmouth in the state of Virginia, and he hereby relinquishes every claim whatsoever to a pension except the present. That his name has been placed on the pension list, that he has never received his pension Certificate therefore Cannot state the number. The reason why he did not make an earlier application for the Continuation of the pension is this. He is incapable of attending to business of this nature himself and his friends whom he procured to write on this subject could not as they informed him, learn any thing about it. Nor did he ever learn that he was on the pension list till three or four Weeks ago when he was informed by letter from Jacob C. Isaacks Esq member to Congress from this District, that he was on the pension list. And in pursuance of the Act of May 1st 1820 I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since

that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain person engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed. I am by Occupation a farmer, I am entirely unable to follow that occupation. my family consists of myself my wife Elizabeth Arnold aged about 52 years. She is unhealthy, much debilitated and nearly incapable of doing any labor, and one daughter named Barbary about the age of 17 years; she has been unhealthy but now seems to be improving with regard to health and strength.

NOTES:

Arnold was apparently in the 2nd Regiment of the Virginia State Line, not in the 2nd Virginia Regiment on Continental Establishment.

On 7 July 1840 Elizabeth Arnold, 64, of White County TN, applied for a pension stating that she married Francis Arnold on 5 Aug 1790, and he died on 5 Feb 1831. On 5 April 1851 she applied under later acts as a resident of Coffee County TN, stating that as Elizabeth Parker she married Francis Arnold in Greenville District SC, and that he died 5 Feb 1830. She stated that she had applied in 1839 when she was a resident of Henry County TN. As proof of marriage she included a page from the original family record. She described her children as follows: "the first child of her self and her husband the said Francis Arnold was born on the 20th June Seventeen hundred and ninety one that his name was William Arnold that they had in all fourteen children that the first five was boys that the sixth was a girl and that the 7th 8. 9. 10 & 11th children was boys that the eighth & tenth children of her self & the said Francis Arnold was born one on the 28 April 1807 the other on the 31st January 1811 as appears on an old leaf in her old testament and which she attaches hereto & which is genuine that the said two children was one by the name of Colberd [born 28 Apr 1807] the other Samuel Arnold [born 31 Jan 1811] that the full or compleet family record which showed all of their births & declarants marriage was lost as above stated." Another page in the file reads as follows: "Elizabeth Parker now Elizabeth Arnold was born December the 23rd in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy five – aged 57 year this date 1832." Peter Arnold deposed that he was born on 28 Sep 1803 as the seventh child of Francis and Elizabeth Arnold. Another witness deposed that Elizabeth Arnold was living with Peter Arnold. Hayes Arnold (as he signed) was administrator of his mother's estate. One Ann Taylor deposed that she became acquainted with Francis and Elizabeth Arnold in Pendleton District SC in 1796 and knew them there until she was 18, when they moved to Tennessee.
