Pension application of Amos Ponder (Pender) W10920 Violet Ponder f55SC Transcribed by Will Graves 7/24/09: rev'd 12/11/17

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]



State of Alabama Lawrence County SS} Before me Henry A McGhee Judge of the Probate Court of said County, began and held in and for the said County, on the 10th day of June 1850, Personally appeared Higdon Robertson who is the Administrator of the Estate of Violett Ponder deceased, widow of Amos Ponder, and who being duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following Declaration for the use and benefit of the children of the said Amos and Violett Ponder, hereinafter named, to wit, John H. Ponder, Alexander Ponder, Elizabeth Ponder who intermarried with Arthur Gairy, Mary Ponder who intermarried with Higdon Robertson (Declarant), Anna Ponder who intermarried with Britain Gallaway, Delilah Ponder who intermarried with Anderson Gallaway, Abner B. Ponder and Rebecca Ponder who intermarried with Jesse Riggs, in order to obtain for the aforesaid children the benefits of the provisions made by the Acts of Congress of 7th of June 1832 -- 7th of July 1838 -- 30th March 1843 and 17th of June 1844.


That the said Amos Ponder was a Lieutenant for the space of time in the War of the revolution, that he was also a private in the said War in the State Troops and Militia of South Carolina, for upwards of 2 years in tours of different durations -- the officers names under whom he served are not recollected,

That the said Amos died on the \_\_ day of February 1802 in the County of Oglethorpe in the State of Georgia, and that his said widow the said Violett died on the 5th of November 1846 in the County of Marion in the State of Alabama, that they the said Amos Ponder and the said Violett Ponder were married in the now County of Oglethorpe in the State of Georgia on or about the \_\_ day of \_\_ 178\_, and that the said marriage did not take place until after the said Amos Ponder had left the Service but took place the time aforesaid.]

That the application is made for the purpose of obtaining the arrears of Pension due the said Amos and his widow under the several Acts aforesaid.

[p 8: On June 27, 1850, in Lawrence County Alabama, Elizabeth Ponder, whose maiden name was Elizabeth Johnson, aged 69, gave testimony that she was present at the marriage of Amos Ponder to Violet Luckey; that they were married in Oglethorpe County Georgia; that Amos died in February 1802 in Oglethorpe; that Violet Ponder continued to live in Oglethorpe until 1824 when she moved to Lawrence County Alabama, where she continued to live until a few years prior to her death when she removed to Marion County Alabama and departed this life there in 1846.]

[p 9: On June 28, 1850, Wiley Galloway, 59, of Lawrence County, Alabama gave a supporting affidavit as to the facts recited above.]

[p 11: On June 28, 1850, Anderson Gallaway, 56, gave testimony in Lawrence County Alabama that he is the husband of Delilah Ponder; that he recalls having free access to the papers of Amos Ponder and that among those papers he recalls seeing a paper purporting and showing that Amos was a Lieutenant in the Revolution in South Carolina.]

To all whom it may Concern

This is to Certify that Mr. Amos Ponder lived in the Bounds of Rocky River Company of Militia to my knowledge from the 1st of May 1781 until our Country was in a State of Peace & During his abode here he always behaved himself like a Trusty Resolute Soldier & Friend to his Country and was Remarkably forward in Engaging in Every Expedition.
