Pension Application of Henry Hull W1432 Elizabeth Hull VA Transcribed and annotated by C. Leon Harris. Revised 18 Dec 2014.

State of Virginia }
Giles County }

On this 30th day of July 1832 personally appeared in open Court before the Justices of the County of Giles now setting Henry Hull a resident of the said County of Giles and state aforesaid aged Seventy years, who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832 That he entered the service of the united states and served as herein stated that he was drafted in the County of Augusta in virginia for the term of eighteen months and that he has forgotten the Regiment and line to which he belonged, that he marched from Staunton under Capt'n Wilson direct to Gilford in north carolina and arrived there a short time before the battle at that place [Battle of Guilford Courthouse, 15 Mar 1781], and was there put under Capt'n. [Andrew] Wallace, that he was in the battle of Gilford That Capt'n Wallace was killed in that battle and that he was beside him when he was shot, that after the battle of Gilford he served under Capt'n [Sigismund] Stribling and marched to Camden in South Carolina and was in that battle [Battle of Hobkirk Hill, 25 Apr 1781] from thence he marched near to Charlestown [Charleston] in South Carolina and lay there several days and then marched to ninety six and was in the battle there [Siege of Ninety Six, 22 May - 19 Jun 1781] at which place he was twice wounded, that he was shot through the thigh and that he was also shot in the side and the ball loged near his back bone, where it remained 12 years before it was Extracted, from thence he was taken to Charlotte in North Carolina, where he remained in the Hospital until he recovered. he then returned to the army in South Carolina. that the army marched to Salisbury [NC] where they were discharged that he then received his discharge having fully served the term for which he was engaged which will fully appear by the original discharge herewith Exhibited [not found] he further states that he was commanded by Major [Thomas] Ridley the greater part of the time and that he does now [sic] recollect the name of his Colonel but thinks it was House or something like that, he further states that he never received any thing for his services having lost the certificate that was given him to receive his pay.

he hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid in open Court

NOTE: On 16 May 1853 in Monroe County now in West Virginia, Elizabeth Hull, 72, applied for a pension stating that she married Henry Hull on 11 Sep 1821, and he died 16 Sep 1835. On an application for bounty land dated 9 April 1855 it was stated that Elizabeth Hull, 75, was married by Robert Chambers, a Methodist minister, and her maiden name was Elizabeth Hawkins.
