Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

Know all men by these presents that I Basil Middleton of the City of Richmond and State of Virginia have this day appointed Thomas D Harris of the City of Richmond and State of Virginia my true and lawful attorney for me and in my name to ask, and received from the United States, four hundred fifty acres of land due me in consideration of my services as Surgeon in the Army of the United States to the end of the late War with Great Britain under the command of Colonel William Russell agreeable to an Act of Congress – And from moreover request, and direct Henry Dearborn Esquire Secretary of War for the time being or his Successors to deliver to the said Thomas D Harris, my true and lawful attorney, or to his order, a Warrant or warrants for the aforesaid land, Hereby ratifying and confirming all and whatsoever my said attorney shall or may do by virtue of these Presents. In testimony whereof I have hereunto affixed my seal and subscribed my name thereto with my own hand this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of July 1807.

I do certify that Doctor Basil Middleton was appointed Surgeon to the 9<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment (to which I was Lieutenant Colonel) sometime in December 1777, and that he has served as surgeon in the Virginia Line until the last arrangement (as well as I recollect) which was sometime last January, when the whole Line was reduced to only one Regiment.

I advise you from the papers in Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 18522, it appears that Basil Middleton was appointed in December, 1777, surgeon and served until the close of the war in Colonel William Russell's Virginia Regiment.

He died in 1808 in Prince George County, Virginia.

The soldier married in September, 1788, Miss Mary

Belchers or Belcher.

She died September 15, 1841 at the home of Mr. and Mrs.

John Cargill in Sussex County Virginia.

T heir children were:

first child, name not given, died when he was 4 months old;

Benjamin, of Petersburg, Virginia, died leaving neither wife nor children:

George, who died without heirs;

Aubin, who married and left 2 sons, author and George B.

Author and George B Middleton were allowed pension due their grandmother, Mary, widow of Basil Middleton.

There is no further data as to the family.]

I do hereby certify that Basil Middleton was acting as a Surgeon's mate to the 6<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment on Continental establishment in the month of February 1776, afterwards promoted. Given under my hand this 30<sup>th</sup> May 1807
