[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indcipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of North Carolina Montgomery County: On this 26 September 1843 Personally appeared before me William Coggin a Justice of the peace for the County aforesaid Euphamy Campbell a resident of the County of Montgomery & State of North Carolina aged eighty years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July the 4th 1836 and the act explanatory of said act passed March the 3rd 1837 that she was married to John Campbell, who was taken off in the service of the United States she thinks in the year 1781 she thinks was first carried to Wilmington North Carolina and from there to Charlestown South Carolina she is very weak in body and mind but she thinks that he was in the Army of the United States nine months at that time she further declares that she was married to the said John Campbell sometime in the spring of 1781 that her husband the aforesaid John Campbell died some time in the month of January 1821 and that she has not married since that she was a widow on the fourth of July 1836 and still remains a widow as will more fully appear by reference to the proof hereto annexed.

Sworn to and subscribed the day and year above written before

N. B. She further states that she and the aforesaid John Campbell was married in the County of Bladen North Carolina and that said Campbell was at the time of their marriage about 31 years of age and that they moved from Bladen County to Montgomery County sometime in the fall of 1805 where said John Campbell died.

State of North Carolina Bladen County

I Neill Kelly one of the acting Justices of the peace in and for the County and State aforesaid, do hereby certify that I am personally acquainted with Archibald Campbell who testified to the Revolutionary Service of John Campbell, husband of Euphemia Campbell that he is a respectable citizen of this County, and has been since my earliest recollection; that he states that he was born on the 15th day of February 1764 in Scotland, that he emigrated to this country in the year 1775, and that he has resided in this County ever since that time; – Mr. Archibald Campbell is also a very intelligent gentleman of unquestionable veracity.
