Pension application of Abel Peck (Peek, Peak) W1989 Lydia f70VA Transcribed by Will Graves 10/6/12

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Tennessee Morgan County: On this the 15<sup>th</sup> day of October 1832 personally appeared before the worshipful Court of pleas and quarter sessions now sitting for the County of Morgan aforesaid it being a court of record Abel Peck a resident citizen of the County of Morgan aforesaid aged about 72 years agreeable to best information and after being duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the Benefit of the act of Congress passed the seventh June 1832. That he entered the service of the United States in the revolutionary war, in Henry County Virginia the precise time not recollected but believed by him to be about two years before the end of the war, the precise time of the year not recollected but knows it was hot weather and thinks it was in August he entered said service under Captain James Shelton a volunteer militia to go against the Tories in North Carolina and the company all met [at] James Lyon's in Henry County Virginia and marched off under said Captain to a place in North Carolina to a place called the Hollows of the Blue Ridge on the waters of the Yadkin [River] and stationed there a month and scouted about in the surrounding Country was in no Battle no remarkable incidents happened was Honorable [honorably] discharged, and had a written discharge for a month's Tower [Tour] and returned home; and sometime thereafter it came to the Turn of Johathan Peck [Jonathan Peck] brother to this applicant who was drafted to serve a three months Tower and he not being a healthy man and having a family, applicant volunteered in his place and marched off from Henry County he left home on the 16<sup>th</sup> day of October with orders to go [to] Hillsborough in North Carolina where we were to join headquarters had no Captain, was put under Captain Richardson at Hillsboro, where he was under General Stephens [Edward Stevens], and marched off with General Stephens and his forces and crossed the Yadkin at a place called the Trading Ford and went through Sallisbury [Salisbury] and went on down into the South State and took up winter quarters at Cheraw Hills, and about the last days of February went on Pedee [River] and crossed the Yadkin again on our return at the same place we crossed where we went, and from a place near the Yadkin applicant was put to guard about 50 or 60 prisoners to Pittsylvania old Court house, that had been taken by some forces at some place not known to this applicant he states that during this Tower he was put under Colonel Glenn and Major Stublefield [Stubblefield], applicant was discharged by a certain man called Captain Threadgill, at Pittsylvania old Court house: said Theadgill [sic] and the Captain he was under lived in some other part, and applicant thinks they lived in the State of Maryland, Applicant had a written discharge from said Threadgill was discharged in the month of March having served two months longer than his Tour for which he started and sometime thereafter he was called on to serve a three months Tower this was the first and only Tower applicant was called on to serve a Tower of his own he marched off from Henry County Virginia

under Captain Crite his first name not recollected and went on joined headquarters at the Mobbin hills [Malvern Hills] and went on to the Siege at York and was there about 23 days before the Surrender of Cornwallis [October 19, 1781] and was there discharged had a written discharge from service having served at least three months, This Tower and this was making in the whole nine months service, This applicant has no record of his age he was born in Buckingham County Virginia and partly raise there and was moved to Henry County and was cut off into Franklin County when that was first made a County and moved to Montgomery County and staid there some years and then moved to Anderson County East Tennessee stayed there about six years and was cut off into Morgan County when it was made a County and he has lived ever since, his discharges are lost and he has no documentary Evidence of his services and knows of no person by whom he can prove his services.

He hereby relinquishes Every claim whatsoever to a claim whatsoever to a pension or annuity Except the present and Declares his name is not on the Pension roll of the agency of any State.

State of Tennessee Morgan County: On this the 15<sup>th</sup> day of July 1833 personally appeared before the worshipful Justices of the court of pleas and quarter sessions for the County of Morgan aforesaid now sitting which is a court of record Abel Peek [sic] a resident citizen of said County aged now about 73 years agreeable to his best information having no record of his age, and after being duly sworn according to law upon his oath states he makes the following amendment to his original Declaration;

He states that for want of Education, and never charging his memory with dates that he is unable to state precisely the times and dates of the different periods of his services as spoken of in the original Declaration but he is certain that the weather was warm when he entered the service his first Tour and thinks it was in the month of August, and is of opinion it was in the year 1779 and as to the second Tour spoken of in his said Original Declaration recollects marching off [from?] Henry County where he then lived on the 16 day of October circumstances having then occurred that makes him retain in memory the precise day he marched off from home, he is not certain in what year for the reasons before stated, he continued, in the service as stated in his original Declaration for five months including the latter part of one year and part of the ensuing year is not certain the dates, but believes that said period of service included a part of the year 1780 and 1781 at this Tower applicant served two months longer than the time he was engaged for having substituted to serve a three months Tour for his brother Jonathan Peek, and was retained in service five months, and as to the period and precise time of entering the service his third Tower spoken of in his Original Declaration he cannot say precisely but knows it was in the summer season, and from calculation must of been rather toward the latter part of July he recollects that he had served at least three months, that last Tour having been discharged accordingly he believes said last mentioned Tower in the year 1781 (as he is told and believes) and was making in the hold nine months, Service as a private soldier, performed at three different Tours the first as volunteer continuing in service only one month, the second as a substitute for his brother, Jonathan Peek and serving five months, and the third Tour he served three months including the Siege at a Little York serving three months, as a drafted soldier, the only Tour that

he was called to serve a Tour of his own, he having first volunteered, secondly gratuitously substituted in place of his said brother, he states that at the time arranging his original Declaration he could not with reasonable Trouble procure the testimony of a clergyman to depose for him there being none anywhere within his vicinity and is still out of his power for the same cause, he states that he has no doubt he can prove a good character for veracity by Levi Taewhitt, Esquire Colonel William Staples, Thomas Jack Esquire Postmaster of his said County, and by all his respectable acquaintances of Morgan County where he lives, and by Colonel James Standifer<sup>1</sup> the member to Congress from his district he being well acquainted with him a great many years, and he believes that all his intimate acquaintance not only believe him to be a man of Veracity but that they all believe him to be a soldier of the revolutionary war.

[f p. 8: On the March 12, 1853 in Scott County Tennessee, Lydia Peake [sic], widow of Abel Peck, who died February 4, 1852 in Morgan County Tennessee made application for the benefit of the laws of Congress as the widow of a revolutionary war veteran; she states that her name prior to her marriage was Lydia Jones; that she was married in Franklin County Virginia in the month of May the exact date she cannot state; that her first child was born about 10 months after she was married and that her first child died at her next was born between 18 & 20 months from the time she was married; that her name is Elizabeth Edens and that she is 56 years of age; that she had 17 living children & two born the dead; that her youngest son [Louis] and child is now going on 35 years of age and lives in Scott County Tennessee; that she and her husband were married by Randolph Hall a Baptist preacher; that she and her husband had eight children when they moved to Anderson County Tennessee and lived there six years, then moved to the place where she now lives and has lived ever since; that she has no record of her age or the ages of her children but that she did have such a record in a book which she kept for many years that her sister took off with her and is now out of her reach; that to the best of her calculations she was married in 1794 or 1795. Her application was signed by her using her mark and is written "Lydia" Peck."]

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$30 per annum commencing March fourth, 1831, for service as a private for nine months in the Virginia militia. His widow was pensioned in a like amount.]
