[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of North Carolina, Johnston County

On this the 25th day of June 1845 personally appeared before me Barzillai Blackmon one of the Acting Justices of the peace in and for said County of Johnston Mrs. Elizabeth Lee a resident of the aforesaid County aged 80 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the Acts of Congress of July 7th, 1838, and of March 3rd, 1843, and of June 17th, 1844 &c--

That she is the widow of the late James Lee who was a private Soldier under Captain Raiford for eighteen months and who she has reason to believe and does believe he served out the said eighteen months faithfully and the war of the Revolution--

That she is not able to tell what Regiment her said husband belonged to or the date on which the said service was performed – That his discharge is lost.

She further declares that she was married to the said James Lee on the 7th day of July 1785. That her husband the aforesaid James Lee died on the 15 day of September 1835. That she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service but the marriage took place previous to the 1st day of January 1794, Viz., at the time above stated --

State of North Carolina, Office of Secretary of Statements

I, William Hill, Secretary of State, in and for the State of North Carolina, do hereby certify, that it appears from the muster-rolls of the Continental line of this State, in the Revolutionary War, that James Lee a private Soldier, in Captain Raiford's Company of the 10th Regiment, ¹ entered the service on the day of ___ 1782 for the term of 18 months.

Given under my hand this first day of June 1846.

¹ J. D. Lewis advises that the designation of the 10th Regiment as the regiment in which a veteran served was often the NC Secretary of State's 'default' designation when he could not find muster rolls giving the actual regiment in which the veteran served.

[p 8: Copy of a marriage bond dated July 6, 1785 issued to James Lee and Stephen Lee conditioned upon the marriage of James Lee to Elizabeth Raines. Certified by the clerk of court of Johnston County North Carolina as a true copy of said bond.]

[p 3: On January 12, 1847 in Johnston County North Carolina, Durham Lee, aged about 60 years, gave testimony that he had been acquainted with James Lee husband of Elizabeth Lee for all of the affiants life; that the affiant has often heard the veteran speak of having served in the Revolution and the veteran enjoyed a history of having served as a soldier in the revolution in his neighborhood. He signed his affidavit with his mark. His relationship, if any, to the veteran and/or his widow is not stated.]

[Veteran's widow was pensioned at the rate of \$40 per annum for her husband service as a private in the North Carolina Continental line.]

² This certificate relates to <u>James Lee S7145</u>, not this veteran. That veteran died without a spouse surviving him. Consequently, it is impossible for this claimant to have been his widow.
