Pension Application of William Grant W42760 VA Transcribed and annotated by C. Leon Harris.

The State of Ohio } Ss County of Hamilton }

Personally came before me the undersigned President Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of the seventh Circuit for the State of Ohio

William Grant now residing in the county and state aforesaid who being duly sworn according to law deposeth and saith that early in the month of November 1776 at the town of Dumfries in the state of Virginia, he enlisted under Capt Gallihue [sic: Charles Gallahue] of the 11th Regiment of the Virginia Line to serve for the term of three years, that he marched with his company under the command of first Lieutenant Davis to Baltimore, and from thence to Boundbrook [Bound Brook] in the State of New Jersey where he joined the American Army early in the Spring of 1777, and particularly his own Regiment which was commanded by Colonel [Daniel] Morgan and at this time belonged to General [William] Woodford's Brigade – that subsequently when the Rifle Regiment under Colonel Morgan was formed from the Army and more especially from the Virginia Line and detatched from the Main Army under General Washington to join the Northern Army, the 11th Regiment to which this deponent belonged, was commanded by Lt Colonel Feebecker [sic: Christian Febiger] and the company in which he served was under Lt. Davis, that he served in this Regiment for three years, but for the latter part of this period the company was commanded by Captain [George] Rice, that he was discharged at Pompton Plains in the state of New Jersey on or about the first day of November 1779 – and this his discharge was signed to the best of this deponents knowledge and recollection by Colonel [James] Wood at that time commandant of the Brigade in the absence of General Woodford – that after the conclusion of peace this deponent left his discharge at a public office in Richmond Virginia, whither all the Virginia line went to receive additional pay to make good the depreciated currency or paper money in which they were paid while in the service where he supposes it is now deposited, and if it is not there, he cannot tell what has become of it. This deponent thinks, the office above alluded to, was called the Pay office but of this he is not certain. And this deponent further deposeth and saith, that in consequence of his advanced age (being now in the 67th year of his age) and reduced circumstances, he stands in need of the assistance of his country for support & further saith not. STATE OF OHIO, Ham. Cou'y Pleas

ON this 29th day of August 1820 personally appeared in open court, being a court of record Expressly made so by the laws of this State for the said County William Grant aged sixty nine years resident in said County who, being duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath declare, that he served in the revolutionary war, as follows, that he the said William Grant enlisted for the term of three years in the month of November in the year 1776 in the state of Virginia in the company commanded by Captain Gollihew in the regiment commanded by Colonel Morgan in the line of the state of Virginia on the continental establishment. That he continued to serve in the said corps until the 1st of November 1779 when he was discharged from the said service in the state of New Jersey that his original declaration was dated on the 15th day of May 1818 that he has received a pension certificate, given at the War Office of the United States on the 23rd day of June 1819 which said certificate is numbered 12229 And in pursuance of the act of the 1st May, 1820, I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner

disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed. And I further declare that I formerly was a house Carpenter by occupation, but I am not able to follow that business on account of my advanced age but more especially as I am verry severely afflicted with the gravel in the kindneys which for the last six months has rendered me unable to do any kind of Work. I have a wife liveing who for the last two years been allmost helpless and for the greater part of the time under a Physicians Care. I am wholly unable to maintain myself and Wife by labour or other means and stand greatly in need from my old age and Poverty of the assistance of my Country for support. And further I declare not

I do certify that William Grant Enlisted as a soldier in the Continental Virginia line in the Service of the united States of america in November 1776 to serve three years which time he served and was discharg'd Nov 1779
