[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Kentucky Todd County SS

On this 13th day of August 1832 personally appeared before the Todd County Court, Peter Petree Sr a resident of Todd County in the County of Todd and State of Kentucky aged 68 years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth upon his Oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

That he enlisted in the Army of the United States in the year 1782 with Captain William Moore and served in the 18 month Regiment of North Carolina, and on the Continental line under the following named officers, field officers, General Greene [Nathanael Greene], Colonel Archibald Lytle; and Captain William Lytle, Sergeant Hurley [Joseph Hurley], Captain Joseph Brevard, Captain Moore and Lieutenant Sanders: he resided in North Carolina Granville County, entered service in the summer of 1782 & left it 18 months after was engaged in no important battle he was in a skirmish at James Island a skirmish on Edisto [River] below Orangeburg he marched from Hillsboro NC to Salisbury NC then to Orangeburg through SC [indecipherable word interlined] then to the four holes below then to James Island where we were stationed in 3 miles of Charleston.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid

I William Hill Secretary of State in and for the State aforesaid, do certify, that it appears from the musterrolls of the Continental line of this State in the revolutionary war, that Peter Petree a private Soldier of Capt. Brevard's [probably Alexander Brevard's] company of the 10th Regiment<sup>2</sup> enlisted in 1782 for the term of 12 months, and that nothing further is said of him on said rolls.

[p 15: On May 12, 1853, in Todd County Kentucky, Mrs. Mary Petree, 75, filed for a widow's pension stating that she is the widow of Peter Petree, a pensioner for his services in the revolution at the rate of \$40 per annum who died in Todd County Kentucky October 20th 1841; that she has not married since her husband's death; that she married him June 25 1837 in Todd County Kentucky; that they were married by Caleb Bell a Methodist preacher.

[p 35: certificate signed by Caleb N. Bell stating that he married Peter Petree and Mary Franklin on June 23rd, 1838 in Todd County Kentucky.]

[p 7: On April 13, 1855 in Todd County Kentucky, Mary Petree, age 77, filed for her bounty land entitlement as the widow of a revolutionary war soldier.]

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$40 per annum commencing March 4, 1831, for service as a private for one year in the North Carolina Continental line. His widow was pensioned in a like amount.]
