[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

## State of Georgia, County of Gilmer

On this Thirteenth day of March in the year 1840 personally appeared before the Honorable Turner H. Trippe Judge of the Superior Courts of the Cherokee Circuit of the State of Georgia Mary Ellis a resident of said County of Gilmer in State of Georgia, aged about Eightyfour years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July 4th, 1836, and the act explanatory of said Act passed March 3, 1837: That she was, married to Walter Ellis on the Eighth day of May in the year 1776, and that she has no witness now living within her knowledge by whom the said marriage can be proven, but that the same is recorded in a Bible, in the possession of deponent, That her said husband was a Soldier during the Revolutionary War, and that he served in the American Army two tours of duty as will appear by the Certificates of discharge hereunto annexed And this said declarant further declares, that her said husband Walter Ellis died on the 13th day of November in the year 1821, and that she was the widow of said Walter Ellis on the fourth day of July 1836, and still remains a Widow, as will more fully appear by reference to the proof hereto annexed.

[p 4: Elijah Ellis [relationship, if any, to the veteran or his widow not stated] of Gilmer County Georgia testified that he was present when Walter Ellis died in Jackson County Georgia on November 13, 1821 and that Walter Ellis never drew a pension for his services as a revolutionary soldier.

Ann Ellis was born March the 8 1781

Stephen Ellis was born August 27, 1783

Mary Ellis was born February 13, 1786

Walter Ellis and Mary Ellis his wife married May the [illegible] 1776

[Note: there is no explanation among the documents in this file as to what became of the family record of the veteran and his widow. I could find no image of that record in this file. On page 22 there is a letter dated May 19, 1840 from J L Edwards, Commissioner of Pensions in which he states that before he can pass on the widow's claim the original of the family record must be cut from the Bible and attached to an affidavit. On p 27 there is a letter dated July 16, 1878 address to the Commissioner of Pensions in which the following statement is made: "I learned from Rev. William Ellis one of the Grand Sons of Mary Ellis that Stephen, Elizabeth & Mary was his uncle & aunts he is a son of James Ellis Brother of Stephen's he wishes the Bible referred to in the within letter to be sent to me to this office." This letter is signed by David Garren [?].]

[Veteran's widow was pensioned at the rate of \$20 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831, for her husband service as a private for 6 months in the North Carolina militia.]
