[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Tennessee Sumner County: On the 7<sup>th</sup> day of September 1832 Personally appeared before Joshua W Talley an acting Justice of the Peace for said County Francis Marshall a resident of Sumner County and State of Tennessee aged eighty-two years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the Benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832 – that he entered the Service of the United States under the following named officers and served three Tours of duty three months each tour in the state of Virginia first time he entered the Service under Captain Thomas Harris who is now dead. He served the second Tour under a Captain Kindreth [?] commanded by General Lawson [Robert Lawson] & Colonel John Archer he served the third Tour as a volunteer under the command of Captain George Williamson General Lawson still commanded and Colonel Parker & Major Duval. He is unable to state the exact time he entered the service. He was in a partial action at Gwinns Island [Gwynn Island] was sationed [stationed?] a part of his time at York Town and at Suffolk & Williamsburg Virginia. He knows of no person at this time that was in the service with him who is alive and living near enough to him to be procured as a witness. He says his Certificates of Discharges are lost or mislaid. The following Questions have been propounded to him

Ouestion the first where & in what year were you born. Answer I was born in the year 1750 November the 8<sup>th</sup> in the County of Cumberland State of Virginia. Question 2<sup>nd</sup> have you any Record of your age and if so where is it. Answer I have it now in the family Register of my Father (which was produced) Question 3<sup>rd</sup> where were you living when called into service where have you lived since the Revolutionary war and where do you now live. Answer. I lived in the County of Chesterfield when I served the first tour and in the County of Mecklenburg when I served the other two tours. He remained in the last named County 30 years and then moved to his present place of residence in Sumner County Tennessee. Question 4<sup>th</sup> How were you called into service were you drafted did you volunteer or were you a Substitute. Answer I was twice drafted and once I volunteered. Question 5<sup>th</sup> State the names of some of the Regular Officers who were with the Troops where you served such Continental and Militia Regiments as you can recollect. Answer. I cannot recollect the number of the Regiments and I have already stated the names of all the principal officers I can at this time Recollect. Question 6<sup>th</sup> State the name of persons to whom you are known in your present neighborhood & who can Testify as to your Character for Veracity and their Belief of your Services as a Soldier of the Revolution. Answer I am personally known to General William Hall our present member to Congress and to John T Carr Esquire who can certify to my Character &c. There is no Clergyman living directly in my

neighborhood and this deponent states he is not able to go to Court as it is a Distance of twenty miles and He is very infirm. And is the reason of his making his affidavit before a Justice of the peace. He hereby Relinquishes every claim whatever to any Pension or Annuity except the present and declares his name is not On the pension roll of the agency of any State whatsoever. Sworn & subscribed the day and year aforesaid.


[p 17: On May 31, 1853 in Macon County Tennessee, Sarah Marshall, 78, filed for a widow's pension stating that she is the widow of Francis Marshall, a revolutionary war pensioner; that she married him in Smith County Tennessee in 1813 (month and and day not recollected); that they were married by Andrew Greer, JP; that her name prior to her marriage was Sarah Jacobs; that her husband died at his residence in Sumner County Tennessee January 23<sup>rd</sup>, 1836 and that she remains his widow.

[p 15: On July 13, 1855 in Macon County Tennessee, Sarah Marshall, about 80, filed for her bounty land entitlement as the widow of Francis Marshall stating that she married him in 1813 in Smith County Tennessee; that they were married by Andrew Greer, JP; that her name prior to her marriage was Sarah Jacobs; and that her husband died in Sumner County now Macon and referred to her family register for the date of his death.]

## [p 10: Family register reading:

Francis Marshall deciest [deceased] Jenuary [January] 23<sup>the</sup> [23<sup>rd</sup>] 1836 Tennessee State Sumner County in the eighty sixth year of his age 85 year 2 months & 15 days



[Facts in file: the veteran married Sarah Jacobs August 2, 1813 in Smith County Tennessee; in 1866 when applying for the reinstatement of her pension following the American Civil War, she stated that she resided "on the waters of the middle fork of Goose Creek in Macon County Tennessee and was being cared for by her daughter Sarah H Jacobs; in addition to the record relating to the death of the veteran, the following family data also appears in this file:

Thomas Thompson born January 29, 1823

Nathaniel Thompson born May 29, 1824

James Thompson born January 17, 1826

The relationship, if any of the above named Thompson children is not stated in the file.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$30 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831, for service as a private for 9 months in the Virginia militia. His widow was pensioned in a like amount.]
