In order to obtain the benefits of the acts of Congress of the 7<sup>th</sup> July 1838, and 23<sup>rd</sup> August 1840 State of Virginia

County of Kin & Queens

On this second day of January 1844 personally appeared before me the subscriber, a Justice of the peace in and for the aforesaid county, Elizabeth Fogg, a resident of the aforesaid county of King & Queen, aged seventy five years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefits of the prevision made by the acts of Congress passed July 7<sup>th</sup> 1838 and the 23<sup>rd</sup> August 1842 granting pensions to widows of persons who served during the Revolutionary War.

That she is the widow of John Eubank who was a Corporal in the Revolutionary War. That she does not know anything of her own personal knowledge of his service in the war, not being acquainted with him at that time, but that she frequently heard her husband, the said Eubank after they were married, speak of having been a long time in the regular service of his country, and has received little or nothing for it, that the money which he received was of but little value, and that upon one occasion he fasted three days and nights, without having anything to eat except a small piece of bread which had been baked in the ashes and which he told her cut sweeter to him, than anything he ever eat in his life before, she further states that she was informed, that he first enlisted in the foot service in 1776 under Capt or Major Thad Hill and that he afterward was permitted to enlist in Col Blevins Regiment of Cavalry in which regiment he continued to serve under Col Temple, and other officers until he was discharged from that regiment. She further declares that she has no documentary evidence of his service, nor does she know of any person now living who can testify to the same.

[p4] She further states that her husband the said Eubank, she thinks for she cannot be positive, was a resident of the county of Caroline in the state of Virginia, when he entered the service (This much she can positively state, however, that he was born and raised in that county) and that he was discharged some time in the year 1780. She further states that she has no record testimony of her marriage, having kept none, but that she was married to the said John Eubank on the 26<sup>th</sup> day of April seventeen hundred and eighty three in the aforesaid county of King & Queen & that her husband, the said, John Eubank died on the 25<sup>th</sup> day of September Seventeen hundred and ninety seven. That she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service, but that the marriage took place previous to the first day of January seventeen hundred and ninety four, viz: at the time above stated . She further declares that after the death of her husband aforesaid, she was married to her last husband Thomas Fogg. That he died the 4<sup>th</sup> day of September Eighteen Hundred and twenty eight and that she is still a widow.

## Addenda to John Eubank W7298

I William Eubank of the County of King and Queen in the State of Virginia, hereby cirtify that I am the son of Elizabeth Fogg (who has subscribed to the foregoing declaration, by her first husband John Eubank, and that I shall be Fifty Five years of age on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of January next. I further Cirtify that I am the third child, of the said, John Eubank and Elizabeth Fogg and that I had another brother younger than myself, who was born before the first day of January 1794. I further Cirtify that my Father the said Eubank, left no will at his death, but that his estate was regularly divided, and one third part allotted to my mother as her dower. Given under my hand this 2nd day of January 1844 Wm Eubank

I do Certify that Jno Eubank enlisted in the 7<sup>th</sup> Virg'a. Reg't of inf[antr]y sometime in the month of february 1776 and was allowed to enlist in Col. Blands [Theodorick Bland's] Reg't. of Cavelry in Decem'r. 1777. during his service in the 7<sup>th</sup> Reg't. he was under my Command and justly deserved the Character Given him in his discharge

Thos. Hill [Thomas Hill] Major

I do Certify that Corporal Eubank enlisted in the 1<sup>st</sup> Reg't. of Light dragoons in the winter 1777 for three years.
