Pension application of Benjamin French¹ W7330 Transcribed by Will Graves

Catharine fn95Va.

[Territory of Alabama, Limestone County]

This day appeared before me Alfred M. Harris one of the Circuit Judges in and for the State of Tennessee, the undersigned Benjamin French who being first solemnly sworn deposeth & saith that he is a citizen of the United States of America and Resident in the County of Limestone in the Alabama Territory. That he did about the 1st of September in the year 1780 in the Revolution in the County of Culpeper in the State of Virginia, enlist as a private in a company of Continental troops commanded by Captain Valentine Harrison in a Regiment Commanded by Colonel John Green and in a Brigade commanded by General Huger. He enlisted and served for the term of 18 months faithfully against the common enemy during the Revolutionary War in said Company, Regiment & Brigade on the Continental establishment, till the end of his term of enlistment was in the battles of Guilford, Eutaw Springs & siege of Ninety Six and was honorably discharged by General Nathaniel Greene, which said discharge he hath destroyed, it was dated the 23rd day of January 1782. He is now about 53 years of age & in indigent circumstances not having any other mode of obtaining a subsistence but by his opponent manual labor: he thinks the stands much in need of assistance from his country for a support. He has never received any pension from his government & hereby releases his claim to all pensions by the laws of the United States heretofore granted him, except the one hereby prayed for. He hopes that he may be placed on the pension list conformably to the provisions of a late act of Congress in such case made and provided 17th Oct. 1818.

County Court of Madison County November Term 1820 District of Alabama

On this 27th day of November 1820 personally appeared in open Court being a court of record for the County of Madison, Alabama Benjamin French aged 56 years tomorrow resident in the County of Limestone in said district who being duly sworn according to law on his oath declares, that he served in the revolutionary war as follows: he enlisted between the middle & 19th of September 1780 was mustered in service under Valentine Harrison Commanded Colonel John Green was in the battle at Guilford, the battle of Camden², Siege of 96; Battle of the Eutaw Springs; besides many skirmishes – his pension certificate bears date the sixth day of June 1820

I, Benjamin French, do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or other wise disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not nor

has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed (to wit) one mare & colt 20 hogs, nine head of cattle, & one half quarter section of Land at \$6.50 per acre on which the first installment only has been paid to the general Government. That he is a planter 56 years old tomorrow that he has a wife and three children living with him the whole females, wife about 54, Anna, about 15, Frances about 14, Jinney about 12 years old.

The State of Alabama, Limestone County

In the circuit Court aforesaid County it being a court of record created so by statute having jurisdiction unlimited in amount & power to fine and imprison &c the honorable Richard Ellis Presiding on the 7th day of September 1824 came Benjamin French aged about [illegible number, looks like 110] years a resident of said County personally into open Court being first duly sworn according to law made the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions of the act of Congress of the 18th of March 1818 & 1st May 1820 & the first March 1823 that he the said Benjamin French in September 1780 he enlisted in the State of Virginia in the company commanded by Captain Valentine [Harrison] in the Regiment commanded by Colonel John Green in the line of the State of Virginia on the Continental establishment that he served faithfully in the said time from the time of his enlistment till they 22nd January 1782 when he was discharged from said service at Salisbury in the State of North Carolina that his name has been placed on the pension list and dropped therefrom on account of his property and in pursuance of the act of the 1st of May 1820 the said Benjamin French made oath further that he was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that he has not since that time by gift sale or in any other manner disposed of his property or any part thereof with intent thereof so to diminish it as to bring himself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that he has not nor has any other person in trust for him any property or securities contracts or debts due to him nor has he any income other than is contained in the schedule hereunto annexed & by him subscribed that since making his former schedule one of the horses therein mentioned died & the other 10 with the hogs and cattle, except a few hogs killed for family use have been sold by the Sheriff of Limestone County on and execution in favor of Thompson Wilson against Benjamin West and said Benjamin French his security that said West gave up the land bought from Ashe McClusky to him as indemnity but land had fallen so much that he could only get a mare and \$20 for the certificate and the mare died shortly afterwards that he yet owns his behalf quarter section of land mentioned in his former schedule which was purchased from the US at six dollars & \$.50 an acre and one installment only paid further credit being taken for the other three installments that his wife aged about 50 his daughter about 22 & his son about 10 years are all the members of his family that live with him that he and his wife are about as stout and healthy as is common for persons of their age to be that he has no hope of ever being able to pay the balance due on his land unless he shall be replaced on the pension list that he has no property or means of support except that is fully disclosed herein unless it be his bidding and wearing apparel.

[On June 7, 1855, Catharine French, 78, of Limestone County Alabama made application for a widow's pension under the act of February 3, 1853 stating that she was the widow of Benjamin French a pensioner, that she married to said French on or about November 10, 1822 [file shows September 23, 1823] in Limestone County and that said Benjamin died in Lauderdale County, Alabama on March 20, 1848.]

[facts in file: Catharine's name prior to her marriage to Benjamin French was Catherine Shumaker [Shoemaker]; Benjamin was born November 28, 1764; Catherine had at least one child, a son, prior to her marriage to Benjamin; several dates appear in the file for the date of death of Benjamin, March 6, 1847, March 21, 1847, March 20, 1848, March 26, 1848, or in March 1849]
