[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." 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State of Georgia, Hall County} On this the third day of September 1832

Personally appeared in Open Court before us Thomas J. Tate, Ezekiel Buffington, Joseph Dunagan Judges of the inferior Court of said County of Hall and State of Georgia now sitting John Moor [sic] Resident of said County of Hall and State of Georgia aged Seventy-five years who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated that he volunteered in the State of North Carolina under Captain Hudson [Cuthbert Hudson] under the command of Colonel Martin in the Militia of North Carolina served that tour but cannot ascertain the time precisely but believes it sometime in the year 1776.

The next May following enlisted under Captain Jeremiah McClain in North Carolina attached to the fourth Regiment under the Command of General Lincoln [Benjamin Lincoln] for six months served the Tour was in several small engagements and fought in the Battle of Stono ferry South Carolina [June 20, 1779]<sup>2</sup> General Lincoln commander, then served a Tour of duty for three months in the militia under Captain Guest [Moses Guest] North Carolina attached to Colonel Armstrong's Regiment. Served another Tour of Militia duty for three months as well as I can Recollect under Captain White of North Carolina was in one scrimmage but no Regular engagement. Still continued to do duty in the service & Hereby Relinquish every claim whatsoever to a pension or annuity except the Present and declares that his name is not on the pension Roll of the agency of any State.

John Moore Answers. I was born in the year 1757 in Pitts [sic, Pitt] County and State of

2<sup>nd</sup> Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?

I never had any Record of my age Received my information from my parents 3<sup>rd</sup> Where were you living when called into service: where have you lived since the Revolutionary War and where do you now live?

I lived in North Carolina when called into service then lived one year in South Carolina has lived ever since in Georgia and lived in Hall County and State of Georgia.

4<sup>th</sup> How were you called into service; were you drafted; did you volunteer or were you a substitute, and if in substitute, for whom?

I entered the Service first by volunteer, then enlisted for six months, then served as drafted Militia &c as duly Required during the War.

5<sup>th</sup> State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops when you served, such Continental and militia regiments as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service.

All the Officers and other Circumstances Relative to my service is set forth in my declaration.

6<sup>th</sup> Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and if so, by whom was it given and what has become of it?

I did Received a discharge from Colonel Thaxton [James Thackston] but it is Lost and I Know not what has become of it.

7<sup>th</sup> State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighborhood and who can testify as to your character for veracity and their belief in your services as a soldier in the revolution.

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Georgia, Hall County

Personally appeared before me the undersigned a Justice of the peace in and for said County John Moore who being duly sworn Deposeth and Saith that by reason of old age and the consequent loss of memory he cannot Swear positively as to the precise length of his Service but according to the best of his recollection he Served not less than the periods mentioned below and in the following grades. For the year 1776 I served one month under Captain Hudson and at the end of that tour I enlisted in the regular Army under Jeremiah McClain and Served one tour of six months being in the same year. In the year 1777 I served one tour of duty of three months in the Militia I think under Captain Guest and was attached to Colonel Armstrong's Regiment and For the year 1780 or 1781 I served another tour of three months under Captain White and was attached to Colonel Armstrong's Regiment during all of which time I was a private Soldier and with an embodied Corps called into Service by competent authority and was in the Garrison at Wilmington North Carolina and that during the time Said Service was performed I was not employed in any civil pursuit. I know of no person whose testimony I can procure who can testify to my Service and for such Service I claim a pension.

[Facts in file: Mary Moore died in Lumpkin County, Ga. 10/27/1844 survived by the following children, Nancy Waits, wife of John Waits, residents of Cherokee County, Ga.; Moren Moore of Hall County (he married Elisabeth Snow September 1, 1808; he married Anna Waits December 28, 18 last 2 digits are illegible); Jacob Moore of Benton County, Alabama (he married Elisabeth Harler or Harlen October 28, 1813; he married someone named Polly thereafter but Bible record of her surname and date of marriage is illegible); Daniel Moore of Cherokee County, Ga.; Mary Light of Hall County, Ga; Prudence Wilson, resident of Gap County, Ga.; Sarah Wharton, resident of Cherokee County, Ga.; and Elizabeth Waits of Alabama. There are Bible records in this file giving birth dates of the children of John and Mary Moore. Also a Bible record appears to read: "John Moore & Mary Miller was Married 3<sup>rd</sup> January 1781"]

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$43.33 per annum commencing March 4, 1831, for service as a private for 13 months in the North Carolina militia and Continental line. His widow was pensioned in a like amount.]
