## Southern Campaigns American Revolution Pension Statements & Rosters

Pension application of Gabriel Gunn W7613 Transcribed by Will Graves Alsey Gunn f57NC 9/8/08 rev'd 11/21/15

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

On this twenty fourth day of December 1832, personally appeared in open Court, before the Judges of the Inferior Court, now sitting, Gabriel Gunn a resident of the County of Newton and State of Georgia, aged sixty-five, the 24<sup>th</sup> of February 1833; who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June the 7<sup>th</sup> 1832. That he entered the Service of the United States under the following named Officers, and served as herein Stated.

That he volunteered under Colonel William Moore of Caswell County North Carolina and Josiah Cole as Captain, And continued in Service upwards of thirty days, and got a discharge the 12<sup>th</sup> March 1781.

Secondly, That he entered the service as a Substitute for Samuel Adams of Granville County North Carolina, for the term of three months in May 1781 under Colonel William Gill [sic, Major William Gill] and Stephen Merit [Stephen Merritt], Captain,

Thirdly, that he entered the State Legion October 11<sup>th</sup>, 1781 for the term of twelve months, in the place of Barnet Geter [Barnett Jeter?] of Granville County and State aforesaid. And served until the 20<sup>th</sup> of May 1782, and then hired John Hix to serve the remainder of the tour and was bound for his faithful performance under Bennett Crafton Major and Samuel Jones as Captain, the former of Granville County, and the latter of Franklin and State aforesaid, as will more fully appear by reference to the two documents hereto annexed.

I hereby relinquish every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declare that my name is not on the pension roll of the Agency of any State. Question 1<sup>st</sup> When and in what year were you born?

Answer: I was born agreeable to my father's register, in the State of North Carolina Orange County afterwards Caswell on the 24<sup>th</sup> of February 1767.

Question 2<sup>nd</sup> Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?

Answer: I have, and it is in my possession.

Question 3<sup>rd</sup> Where were you living when called into service: where have you lived since the Revolutionary War and where do you now live?

Answer: When called in Service I lived in North Carolina Caswell County. Since my general residence has been in the aforesaid County & State, with the exception of 4 years, I lived in South Carolina. In 1805 I came to the State of Georgia, and now live in the same. Question 4<sup>th</sup> How were you called into service; were you drafted; did you volunteer or were you a substitute, and if in substitute, for whom?

Answer: 1<sup>st</sup> I left my Mother without her consent, and joined as a volunteer. 2<sup>nd</sup> I Substituted for Samuel Adams of Granville County North Carolina. 3<sup>rd</sup> I substituted for

Barnett Geter of the aforesaid County & State.

Question 5<sup>th</sup> State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops when you served, such Continental and militia regiments as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service.

Answer: 1<sup>st</sup> We were commanded by General Greene [Nathanael Greene] Commander in Chief. The North Carolina Militia was commanded by General Butler [John Butler]. But Colonel Moore's Regiment to whom I belonged frequently acted as Infantry to Colonel Lee [Henry "Light Horse Harry" Lee] & Colonel Washington [William Washington] who commanded the light Horse. The 2<sup>nd</sup> tour I served I do not recollect that we were ever stationed with any Continental Troops, though I frequently saw Continental officers passing, such as General Sumner [Jethro Sumner] and Colonel Litle [Archibald Lytle]. The 3<sup>rd</sup> tour, we were first stationed at Bute Court House, and thence we removed to Durham halls in Franklin County, and thence to Hillsboro, in Orange County to guard the Legislature and public Stores.

Question 6<sup>th</sup> Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and if so, by whom was it given and what has become of it?

Answer: I received the first from Colonel William Moore at the High Rock Ford on Haw River, three days before the Battle of Guilford [March 15, 1781]. The 2<sup>nd</sup> discharge I received from Colonel William Gill of Granville County North Carolina. The 3<sup>rd</sup> I received from Major Bennett Crafton, and I have the same, the other two are lost or mislaid. Question 7<sup>th</sup> State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighborhood and who can testify as to your character for veracity and their belief in your services as a soldier in the revolution.

This day came John Hix before me and made oath that on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of May 1782 he entered into the State Legion of North Carolina in the place of Gabriel Gunn and continued therein until the 12<sup>th</sup> of October following or thereabouts, at which time he got a discharge from Major Bennett Crafton of said State Legion but that he hath either lost or mislaid the same – also that he has not received anything, or given any orders to any person for the said service.



[p 9: On September 25, 1855, in Chambers County Alabama, Alsey Gunn, 77, filed for a widows pension under the 1853 act stating that she married Gabriel Gunn; and that her husband died in Newton County Georgia September 26, 1839. She signed her application with her mark.]

[Facts in file: Alsey's name was Alsey Canup at the time of her marriage to Gabriel Gunn; in 1858, she lived with her son, John Canup, in Randolph County, Alabama; she moved to Troup County, Ga., in June 1858 and died either on January 14 or February 14, 1859 at the home of her son, John Canup; p 22: her estate was administered by one Solomon E. Jordan, 47, in Randolph County, Alabama.]

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$38.90 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831, for service as a private for 11 months and 19 days in the North Carolina militia. His widow was pensioned in a like amount.]
