Breckinridge County On this 9th day of April 1853 before me Williamson Cox, presiding judge of this county court within and for this county and state aforesaid, personally appeared Elijah R Eskridge, a resident of the county and state aforesaid, who, being duly sworn according to law, on his oath, makes the following declaration, towit:

That he is a son and heir at law of George Eskridge, deceased, late, of the county of Grayson, and State of Kentucky, who was a Revolutionary soldier, and, who dies in said county of Grayson on the eighteenth (18th) day of August one thousand eight hundred and twenty seven (1827) aged about sixty four (64) years leaving Elizabeth Eskridge, his widow, who survived him and remained a widow until the twenty first (21st) day of July one thousand eight hundred and forty four (1844) when she died in the county of Breckinridge and State of Kentucky, aged seventy three (73) years seven (7) months and one (1) day leaving the following named her surviving and only surviving children: Mrs. Nancy Porter aged sixty (60) years, Nathaniel R Eskridge ages fifty five (55) years Mrs. Elizabeth Wilson ages fifty three (53) years Joseph W Eskridge (who dies about the year one thousand eight hundred and forty six (1846) at the age of forty four years (44) John Eskridge aged forty nine (49) years Henry Eskridge aged [p4] forty six (46) years, George Eskridge aged forty three (43) years, and Elizabeth R Eskridge aged forty (40) years. He further declares that the said George and Elziabeth Eskridge were married in the County of Prince William and State of Virginia later in the year one thousand seven hundred and ninety one (1791) or early in the year on thousand seven hundred ninety two. That he does not know of any public or private record of said marriage for proof of which he refers to the annexed record of the births of their children it being the genuine original family record kept by his father in his own hand writing. That Wm Kenner Eskridge and Molly Eskridge whose names are _____ said record are the children of the said George Eskridge by a previous marriage. He also refers to this accompanying affidavits. That the name of his mother before her marriage with the said George Eskridge was Elizabeth Robinson. He further declares that the said George Eskridge was a soldier in the war of the Revolution. That he enlisted in the Virginia Continental line of the army in the County of Westmoreland and served about three (3) years as orderly sergeant & commissary in the company of Captain Burgess Ball in the regiment of Colonel Parker. That after the expiration of that term of service he was drafted and served for a considerable length of time but in what company or regiment he does not recollect. He thinks that a portion of the

[p5] time he served as Lieutenant. That his certificate of discharge has been lost or destroyed. That he has often heard his father speak of having been in the Revolutionary war and of having received a discharge. That he has heard him relate many anecdotes and incidents connected with his service. That his father also had a large amount of "Continental money" which he heard him say he received in payment of his services in the war a fraction of which is now in the possession

of his children. He further declares that his father rece	eived a land warrant for four hundred (400)
acres in consideration of his service in the Revolutionary war which he located in the State of	
Ohio near where the town of Chillicothe now stands. He further declares that he makes this	
declaration for the purpose of obtaining for the heirs of the said George and Elizabeth Eskridge	
the benefits of the act of Congress of	or of any other act or acts of Congress
granting a pension to the widows or children of deceased Revolutionary Soldiers. That for proof	
of service, he refers to the army records and muster rolls and to the accompanying affidavit \.	
Asserts he does not know whether it was during the first or last term of his service that in the	
company of Captain Bull and the regiment of Col. Pa	rker. s/ E.R. Eskridge
Subscribed and sworn to before me this 9 th day of April 1853 and I

of the most highly respectable and worthy citizens of Breckinridge County and that all his

These are to certifie that George Eskridge Formerly a Sergeant in the 8th Virginia Regiment has Duly & faithfully Serv'd the Term of Three years in Consequence of which and at his own request he is hereby Discharg'd from any farther Service in the Army of the United States & Permited to return to his home free & unmolested, he having received all his Bounty Pay & Clothing and Deficencies of Pay & Cloathing in full of all Allowances & Provision made by the Congress for their Troops his receip for which is on the Back hereof

Given under my hand at Philadelphia/ This 3^d day of Feb'y 1784 Christian Febiger Colo Comm't [another illegible signature]

I Do Hereby Give Jno Roberts[?] full Power to settle my Acc't with the Commonwealth & Receive my pay as Serj't for me

NOTES:

The federal pension file includes a copy of a bond signed on 17 Feb 1792 in Prince William County by George Eskridge and Nathaniel Robertson for the marriage of Eskridge to Elizabeth Robertson. Also in the file is the family record transcribed below.

The file includes many other documents not transcribed, including a personal letter from William K. Eskridge of "Loudon" dated 18 Sep 1810 to his "Very dear and Honoured Father" – "George Eldridge, near Mayslick Kentucky."

Joseph Wilson Eskridge the Son of the Above Two was born the 2nd day of February AD 1802

John Eskridge The Son of The above Two was born the 4th day of February AD 1804

Geo. Henry Eskridge the [page torn] was Born 14th day of May 1810
